

STATE CONGRESS OF MINING WILL BE FORMED JAN. 14

The Oregon Mining congress, composed of representatives of the various sectional mining congresses of the state, will be organized at the regular meeting of the Western Oregon Mining congress at Salem, Saturday, Jan. 14. It was announced by George W. Jennings, president of the Western Oregon congress.

Letters have been received from representatives of the various mining groups of the state indicating they would be present at the sessions for the purpose of forming the state organization to speak for mining of the state.

Several prominent mining men are expected at the meeting, Jennings declared. Among them will be A. S. Kerry, Seattle, well-known mining man of the northwest and chairman of the mining committee of the Seattle chamber of commerce. He will discuss the silver question.

Other matters to be discussed include the establishment of a mining school in this state, the organization of a state bureau of mines, methods of investigating mining projects suggested by Dr. Warren D. Smith, of the geology department of the University.

James W. Mott, corporation commissioner and congressman-elect from this district, will attend the sessions and will discuss the Blue Sky laws in relation to mining. The manager of the northwest office in Portland of the federal Reconstruction Finance Corporation will be present to discuss the possibility of obtaining R. F. C. funds for the development of mining in this state.

Mining machinery and equipment of the latest type will be displayed by various manufacturers and a gold panning demonstration will be held on the street in front of the Salem chamber of commerce. A class of 80 men who have been studying gold panning will assist in this demonstration.

Cecil Wooley of Cottage Grove, inventor of a new type of small portable stamp mill, will demonstrate his machine in action and the Mineral Recovery company of Cottage Grove will display several samples of concentrated ore and will explain the new methods of concentration. At least 1000 persons are expected to attend the meetings.

Clothing Meetings Planned This Week

The final meeting for the Pleasant Hill district for demonstration of clothing renovation will be held at the home of Mrs. M. Stewart Monday at 1:30 p. m. Monday afternoon the county executive committee of home extension work will hold a special meeting at the Eugene chamber of commerce, Miss Skow announced. This meeting will be held at 1:30 o'clock.

Fox Theaters In Eugene Said Okay

The Fox McDonald and Fox Rex theatres of Eugene are not included in the group of Fox West Coast theatres which were reported to be in the hands of the receiver recently. It is announced by Ray W. Jones, manager of the Fox McDonald.

Mr. Jones received a telegram Saturday from Frank L. Newman Sr., northwest division manager of the Fox West Coast theatres, announcing that the two Eugene theatres were not included in the group of northwest houses in the hands of the receiver. The Whiteside theatre at Corvallis, and the Craterian and Rialto theatres in Medford, also are not included in the group.

Lamb Information Will Be Broadcast

Information on the care of lambs will be broadcast over radio station KOAC by Oran M. Nelson, professor of animal husbandry in Oregon State Agricultural college, during the next three weeks, according to an announcement received at the office of the county club agent.

Professor Nelson will speak on "Preparations for Lambing," Wednesday, January 11; "Lambing Practices," January 18, and "Growing and Marketing Lambs," January 25. All addresses will be broadcast at 7 p. m.

Recreation Group Will Meet Tuesday

KIWANIS CLUB TO HOLD OPEN MEET ON MONDAY NOON

An open meeting to which all other service club members and others interested are invited will be held by the Eugene Kiwanis club at its weekly luncheon meeting Monday noon at the Osburn hotel.

Dr. Inazo Nitobe, head of the Japanese section of the Institute of Pacific Relations and former representative of Japan at the League of Nations, is to be the speaker.

At this meeting the club is to get its new year organized under the new officers headed by Arch A. Bernard as president.

On the following Monday, January 16, the club will observe the 18th anniversary of the founding of Kiwanis International. The local Kiwanians will join with members in 1,873 other communities throughout the United States and Canada to observe this event.

The first Kiwanis club was organized in Detroit in 1915 and on January 21 of that year the first meeting was held. "Kiwanis has made a valuable contribution to community life during the past 18 years and today it is offering greater civic betterment and social welfare programs than ever before," said Mr. Bernard, the new president, adding, "We are going to make our observance of Kiwanis Anniversary week a fitting and proper occasion presenting our achievements for the past year and in the meeting explain something of the history of Kiwanis International."

The Eugene Kiwanis club has furnished 7,888 pints of milk for school children during the school year 1931-32 as the greatest thing financially in the club for the year.

In addition, the club has arranged inter-club affairs with Roseburg, Albany, and other surrounding clubs; has taken an active interest in Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, city play grounds; given support to the chamber of commerce; carried on a program to have every citizen register and vote; has entertained the University of Oregon football squad, coaches and trainers at luncheon; made special observances of Kiwanis International anniversary, Washington and Lincoln birthday anniversaries, the local club's anniversary, music week, constitution week, education week; entertained Civil War veterans on Memorial day; observed Armistice day with a special program; assisted in child welfare work, particularly stressing Red Cross work; observed Thanksgiving day; held a fathers' sons' and daughters' luncheon at Christmas time; gave donations of toys to Welfare League to give out to needy children; and sponsored a number of social events for wives and guests of members.

NOTED STATESMAN OF JAPAN TO TALK IN GERLINGER HALL

Fundamental issues in the Far East, international activities and a program for internationalism will be topics for addresses of Dr. Inazo Nitobe, famed internationalist from Japan, who will be in Eugene Sunday and Monday, January 8 and 9. Dr. Nitobe will deliver three addresses, the first Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in Gerlinger hall, the second Monday at 11 o'clock at the general university assembly, and another at the Kiwanis club Monday noon.

Dr. Nitobe, who is a member of the imperial house of peers of Japan and chairman of the Japan National Council of the Institute of Pacific Relations, is regarded as an authority on international affairs. In addition to

his work on Pacific affairs, he was under-secretary for the league of nations from its founding in 1919 to 1927. He is now on a tour in the interests of the Institute of Pacific Relations, the organization that is taking the lead in bringing nations of the Pacific basin together.

A liberal in both politics and in his view of the Far East problems, Dr. Nitobe is enabled to present a clear, unbiased picture of world events and has succeeded in arousing wide interest wherever he has appeared.

Dr. Nitobe is also an authority on present day conditions in Japan and other countries of the Orient. He is the author of "Bushido, the Soul of Japan," one of the most widely read books on the Orient.

The Sunday afternoon meeting and the student assembly are both open to the public and all those interested are urged to come. It is announced by Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration at the university, who is in charge of Dr. Nitobe's appearance here.

Pine Lumber Orders Reported Slightly Over Previous Week

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—New business in the pine area of the western states, amounting to 15,771,000 feet, was reported by the Western Pine association here today for the week ending Dec. 31. This was less than one per cent above the total for the previous week, and 63 per cent under the 3-year average for December.

The total was based on reports from 115 mills, only 22 of which were operating.

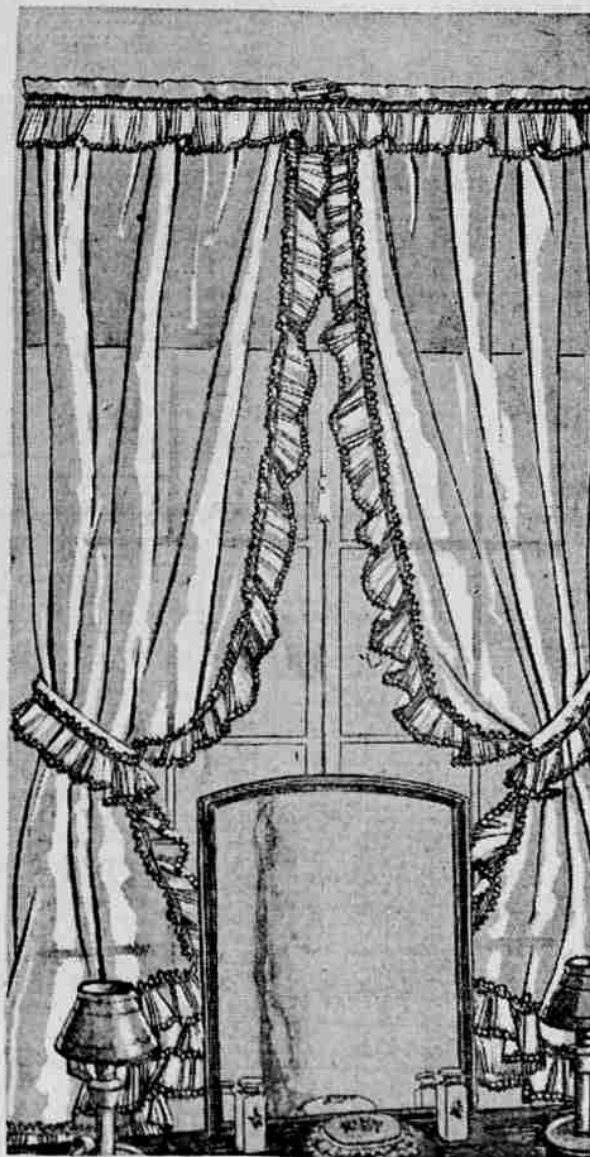
Shipments were 15,797,000 feet and production, 9,449,000 feet. The latter figure put production at about 7 per cent of capacity as compared with 8.3 per cent for the previous week and 18.6 per cent for the year. Current orders were said to be about 11 per cent of sawmill capacity.

Orders from these mills for 1932 amounted to 1,711,101,000 feet, and shipments 1,747,126,000 feet or about 29 per cent under 1931. Production showed a decrease of about 42 per cent with a total of 1,323,801,000 feet.
