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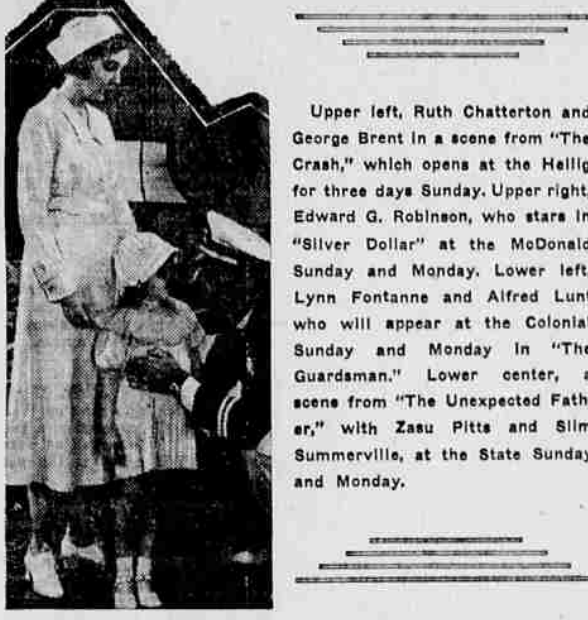

HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 7.—(P)—Two life sentences, to run consecutively, were imposed on Aubrey Welch, 39, in circuit court here Friday for the slaying of his wife and their 8-year-old daughter at Tigard Dec. 28.

Welch pleaded guilty to two separate charges of second degree murder. A life term was imposed in each case.
