

Webfoots Rise And Smite Southern Oregon Normal Team, 38 to 17

OREGON WINS IN WALK AS DEFENSE HANDGUFFS SONS

COUGARS WIN
PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 7.—(AP)—With determination and a fine exhibition of sharp shooting, Washington State college came back tonight to defeat Oregon State 27 to 20 to split a two-game basketball series.

With revenge in their hearts and accuracy in their shots, the Oregon basketball team not hot Saturday night and smothered the Southern Oregon Normal team, 38 to 17.

The victory not only helped to avenge the three defeats suffered at the hands of the Ashland squad, but gives the Webfoots encouragement as they prepare for the opening of the northwest conference against Washington State here next Friday and Saturday nights. The Sons had previously won twice at Ashland and once on the Webfoot's home floor.

The Oregon defense tightened Saturday evening and Howard Hobson's court was able to crack it for only 10 points in the first half and 7 in the second. Though Oregon continued to miss numerous easy shots, the Webfoots' shooting eyes were much improved over Friday evening.

The individual Oregon players ran a dead heat for scoring honors. Watts, Olinger, Roberts and Robertson each accounting for eight points while Miller chalked up six. B. Jones, Ashland guard, was high point man for the visitors with six while McLean and Howell each scored five points.

Webfoots on Offense
Oregon took the offensive with the opening gun when Miller scored two baskets and Watts and Olinger each one before Ashland got started. Then the visitors went into action and McLean scored three points and Jones four, bringing the Sons to within one point of Oregon, the closest they came to catching up during the game.

Then Roberts hit the basket for five points on a pair of field goals and a free throw and Robertson ringed the basket for another two points, advancing Oregon's scores to 15 points. Jockish tossed a free throw while B. Jones scored another field goal for Ashland and Olinger made good a free throw for Oregon to bring the score to 16 to 10 as the half ended.

Miller once more opened the Webfoots scoring in the second half with two points while Howell and McLean each accounted for a field goal for the visitors. After that it was all Oregon with Robertson making warm and tossing in three in a row from the floor. A trio of free throws ended the Son's scoring while all of the Webfoot regulars turned in points before the game ended.

Oregon basketball followers were considerably cheered by the Webfoots' victory over Ashland normal here Saturday evening, but they are awaiting the opening games with Washington State before making up their minds as to the 1933 conference possibilities. Bill Reinhardt's team will tackle the Cougars here Friday and Saturday night in McArthur court. All Oregon games will start at 7:30 o'clock this year, by the way.

At times Saturday evening the Oregon squad looked good. At other times they showed a marked tendency to miss crumples. If they get their shooting eye by Friday night, they may make things tough for the visiting Washington State who lost to Oregon State Friday evening 22 to 25 and then turned around and won Saturday night, 27 to 20.

Reinhardt, Oregon coach, is making no promises this season. Although he has several fast men on his squad, he has no tall men to throw in against such giants as most of the northwest teams boast. Fortunately, Cap Roberts makes a dependable center in spite of the inches he has to spot every other northwest center and the Webfoot tip-off formation was giving them the ball Saturday night despite the height handicap.

The turnouts at both games, the associated students will probably play in the fans for the official conference games. Oregon has a colorful, hard-fighting squad this year and one that assures plenty of action in every game, win, lose or draw.

Eugene high players feel that they have been neglected by the press. Maybe we have been a bit remiss about running Eugene dope, but they have been conceding the title by so many local authorities that we have rather come to take them for granted. Eugene really has a wonderful bunch of players. All veterans of at least a year's campaigning, they appear to have all it needs to win the district crown.

Guards are Roy Northam, a dead shot at long range and one of the best defensive players in the county, and Hugh Mercer. Mercer usually heads the ball to the other members of the team, and doesn't run up big scores. However, he possesses what is probably the most polished floor game of the team. That's about all we have room for, but we'll run more later. Feel better, boys?

The Lowell Red Devils girls' team defeated Thurston high, 28 to 24 in a hard fought battle played at Thurston Friday evening. The tilt was a thriller from start to finish, with Lowell spurring at the last to win after trailing for some time.

AMATEUR SPORT TO ENJOY GOOD YEAR IN '33: BRUNDAGE

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Amateur sports stuck out its chest in 1932, and faces another banner season in 1933.

Given impetus by the Olympic Games, amateur sports had its greatest year in history.

For 1933 there are hopes of another outstanding year. Present plans of the management of the Century of Progress, the world's fair to be held in Chicago contemplate a complete program of sports and games, including many international events, so that the momentum gained in 1932 will not be lost.

"The greatest year in history"—this rating for 1932 is established not because of quality of performance but more especially since in the past year the true importance of amateur sport has been demonstrated. People of all nations, faced by the collapse of business and industry, witnessing the crashing of reputations and the failure of established institutions, and almost convinced that there is something wrong with our form of civilization, turned for relief and recreation to clean, wholesome amateur sports and games.

True Democracy
Whether as participant or spectator at these events of equal opportunity for all, where the best man wins regardless of race, color, creed, family, or financial standing, they have come again to realize the value of pure democracy from which in other fields we have strayed so far. They have learned to disdain sharp practice, to respect the rights of others, to insist on common honesty, courtesy, and fair play, and to appreciate the value of physical strength, mental alertness and moral soundness.

Track and field athletics perhaps provided the greatest number of thrilling performances during the year. Following a winter and spring of record breaking, in the eight days of competition at Los Angeles, twenty new Olympic and seven new world records in the twenty-three events for men, and six new Olympic and world records in six events for women, were made in the most brilliant program of events ever held.

It is hard to choose between William Carr's phenomenal 46.2 seconds for the 400 meters and the race in which Tom Hampson of England broke 1:50 for the 800 meters for the first time in history. The new record of 84:23 points in the deathmatch created by Jim Busch of Kansas, and Eddie Tolson's double win, in the dashes deserve mention. Leo Sexton's shot putting, the work of Gene Venzke and George Spitz in the indoor meets, and the marvelous pole vaulting at Palo Alto in the trout, will be long remembered.

WILLAMETTE WINS
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Willamette University's basketball team wound up its pre-conference season tonight by defeating the Multnomah club quintet of Portland 30 to 24. Willamette walked away to an overwhelming lead in the first half, 20 to 5, but the clubmen had things largely their own way in the second half but couldn't overcome the Bears' lead. Kaiser of Willamette and Fairbank of Multnomah tied for scoring honors with 10 points each.

Playing Managers Not So Hot, Opines Writer

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(NEA)—According to past performances, recorded on baseball's form sheet of the last 15 years, you can rub the names of the Washington Senators, Chicago White Sox, Boston Red Sox, Chicago Cubs and New York Giants off the list of likely participants in the 1933 world series.

FOR: The player-manager on the field is able to study the weakness of the opposing team while he is playing. His leadership on the field is

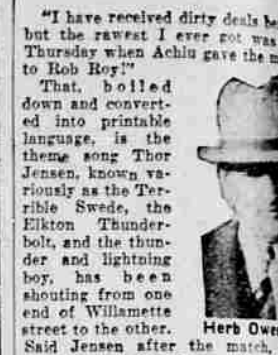
