JAPAN'S SIDE IN FAR EAST TROUBLE TOLD BY SPEAKER

TWO JAPANESE

The threat of Russia, the chaotic condition of the Chinese government, and the psychology of the Chinese people must be taken into consideration before the world can say Japan has taken a step which no civilized nation can accept, declared Dr. Inazo Nitobe, head of the Japanese division of the Institute of Pacific Relations, in a talk before the Eugene Kiwanis club Monday noon at the Osburn hotel. About 125 were present for the meeting, including many guests.

One great cause for misunderstanding of Japan's part in the present controversy in the Far East is that the Japanese government has been slow in telling what it means to do and what it is doing, the speaker said, saying this was so because of Japan's dislike for publicity and its hate of propaganda.

Because news first flashed from China that there was trouble there, public opinion was formed that Japan had invaded without the slightest provocation and it has become difficult to change that opinion, he said. "I know that the action of Japan will be justified in the eyes of God, however," Dr. Nitobe said. He then took up the three points he considered as the outstanding issues.

First, he said, Japan is afraid of another war with Russia. It is not a cowardly fear, but one founded, at least, on history. In the early part of this century, Japan taxed its national existence to drive out Russia from Manchuria. Today Russia is carrying on the same process of occupying parts of China, only it is the new Russia. Few are aware of how large a slice of land Russia has taken in Mongolia from China and making it into a communistic section. "We fear Russian encroachment because we do not like Russian communism," Dr. Nitobe said. Japan must protest liberty and the ideals of the western world.

Secondly, the speaker pointed out that China is so disorganized that its neighbors suffer. The central Chinese government represents only five per cent of the population. Japan wants to see a stable government in China that there may be greater stability in commerce. "Have you Americans not suffered from disorderly neighbors?" he asked, mentioning the Central American countries and Mexico. To live together and to prosper together is the goal for Japan and China, he said.

The third point stressed was the psychology of the Chinese people. "There are people who fear nothing unless physical force is used," he said. "I do not say the Chinese people as a whole are cowardly. I look up to the Chinese as one of the greatest peoples of the world, but the few war lords who rule are afraid of only physical force, he added. Dr. Nitobe said he deplored war in general and the bombing of innocent cities but that force was the only way out, now.

The league of nations can not answer all questions, he declared, adding that Japan and China have contacted each other for thousands of years and that Japan knows the Chinese people. But Brown Barker, vice-president of the university, introduced the speaker, Toyochi Nakamura, counsel for Japan in Portland, who was also a guest at the luncheon with Dr. Nitobe.

ardent nationalist that the aim will be to make the citizen's nation a worthy one among all the nations of the world, was outlined to more than 2000 students and others gathered at assembly Monday on the campus of the University of Oregon by Dr. Nitobe.

"As we grow in the knowledge of other peoples and of the law of universal progress, we shall realize more and more that all the higher interests of a nation are in harmony with the welfare of the whole human race," Dr. Nitobe said. "and that they are served best by co-operation among the nations of the earth."

"The world is one in spirit and body. Neither the ghosts rising from the graves of feudalism nor the Chauvinism shouting from the rostra of nationalism can tear it asunder. It is hence the part of wisdom to be forearmed for the day when co-operation will rule the conduct of races and nations."

"We can be international only when we are national. Take away the 'national' from the 'international' and we have only 'inter,' a 'between' space, into which we fall in these days when all countries are knit together by many ties, a patriot, if he is to be a genuine one and not a sordid professional, must needs be an internationalist, for by making his country a worthy member of the family of nations he will serve the highest purpose of his race."

A plea for fair-mindedness in such matters as tariff, foreign exchange and other international affairs was made by Dr. Nitobe.

banking system was that it should serve the needs of the common run of our people."

He advocated enactment of the Steagall guarantee bill passed by the house last spring.

Turning to "another vital problem," he declared "I am convinced that inflation of the currency must be brought about to restore the prices of commodities in order that taxes, interest and debts may be paid and our standard of living maintained."

"There are two methods, in my opinion, by which safe inflation may be brought about," he said. "The first, and in my mind the most desirable, is an increase in metallic money. With the present supply of gold, and that which is likely to be produced, the only practical way to increase the amount of metallic money is by adding silver."

Increase of paper currency would accomplish the same result by "devaluation of the gold dollar," he said, but added that "this method would involve a period of financial disturbance which could be avoided by the first method."

He concluded by saying "that if there was ever a time when leadership, vital, fearless and constructive leadership, was needed, it is now. We need men of iron will who will meet the challenge of a new day with the spirit of Andrew Jackson."
