

WORK OF RAISING HOME EXTENSION FUND UNDER WAY

Committees were to be appointed Tuesday night at a meeting of the county recreational and dramatics group to assist the county project leaders in their plans to support the construction of the home extension office in Lane county and raise a fund to retain Miss Gertrude L. Shaw, county home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Truman Chase, county project leader in games, will have charge of a series of parties which will be given in different communities throughout the county, and Mrs. George Saunders, county project leader in dramatics, will have charge of one-act plays which will be given in the county-wide context and also in some local communities. This is one of the county-wide groups which have already made definite plans to assist in the movement started Monday to raise money for the retention of the work here when 17 homemakers met at the chamber of commerce at the request of the county executive committee.

These women are acting as a council and represent all parts of the county. Those members who were unable to attend sent word to Mrs. Ralph Laird, county chairman, pledging support and cooperation in the movement. The work, to operate under a curtailed budget, will be centralized in order to cut down on travel. However, the program adopted at the county homemakers' day last spring will be carried through in full. It is announced. The activities necessary in raising funds for the office will be handled by the homemakers, and the home demonstration agent will proceed with the adult education teaching as usual in order that the program can move forward.

city had been found inadequate, the board announced a committee had been appointed to investigate a plan to provide satisfactory meat inspection for the city. This committee will report early this year. The board also announced its intention to take up the sewage question this year and in addition will renew efforts to get the fish racks in the McKenzie placed below the intake of the city water system.

Dr. M. C. Harris, chairman of a sub-committee of the board of health, named to investigate the advisability of consolidating the milk inspection with the food inspection, submitted a report which declared that "any change at this time would materially set back the dairy industry."

The committee found there were 81 dairies supplying milk to the city, 25 of them grade A, 28 grade B, 53 shipping to maturing plants and the rest grade A raw. Dairies were found to be inspected each month and the pasteurizing plants twice each week. It found 90 restaurants, stores and hotels checked twice each year.

Parking Studied

The committee found that the city most ordinance contradicted itself and recommended it be rewritten.

The fire chief's six month report showed a fire loss during that period of \$2,848.84. Total insurance carried in the property threatened was \$422,450 and insurance collected on a damage was \$2,777.83.

A report of the building inspector for the month of December showed permits totaling \$7,705 with \$91.35 in fees. The annual report of the police department was read and approved.

The council condemned a building at 2440 University street, George Brent, the owner, was given 25 days to take action on removing the nuisance. At the request of the superintendent of buildings and grounds at the university, parking on University street from Thirteenth avenue to the railroad was restricted to the east side of the street. The council authorized Recorder Bryson to seek information regarding regulation of parking on steep hill streets. This is to be sought in regard to the situation on West Nineteenth between Willamette and Olive. Parking is prohibited there now, but complaint has been heard by residents and a change may be made.

Recorder Banded

A request for permission to operate a rooming house at 624 Williams street, made by Lillie E. Rogers, was granted.

Upon motion of Councilman Lamb, the salary of C. A. Le Van, street commissioner, was increased from \$121.50 to \$126.00 to equal that paid to other heads of departments.

Purchase of a bond for \$1000 on the city recorder, necessary each year, was approved by the council. W. N. Wintler, 1483 Pearl street, submitted a plumbing bill of \$4 necessitated in finding out sewer trouble at his residence. The matter was referred to the sewer committee.

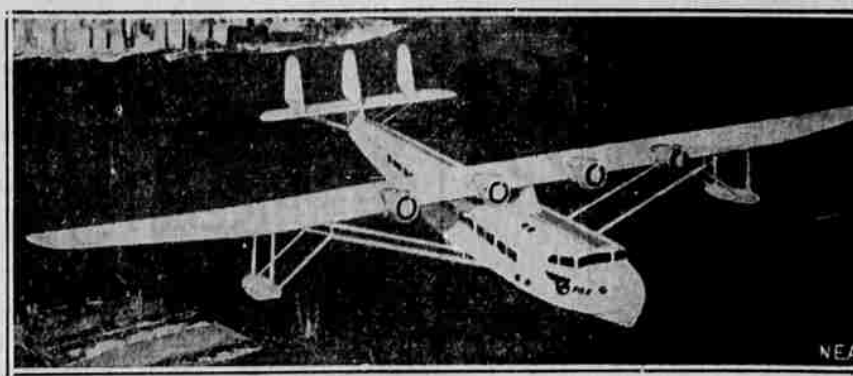

Science Produces Startling Discoveries Despite Period Of Lag In Many Other Lines

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 10.—(AP)—For a discovery that heralds a new science, the union of chemistry and physics, with practical, human applications outstripping past progress, 32-year old Henry Eyring, Ph.D., Princeton university chemist, was awarded the annual \$1,000 prize of the American Association for the Advancement of Science for "an outstanding paper."

Eyring is one of a group of youngsters in American science who have been showing how physics, the science which tells how atoms are made and how these invisible things combine to move the earth and stars, can be combined with chemistry, second largest industry in this country.

Chemistry at present gets its miracles by starting with large masses, which can be seen, and digging downward into the unknown to synthesize new products of commerce. The youngsters propose to start at the heart of the matter, with the invisible atom, and work outward.

Less waste of money and time that way, they say. Eyring's paper is a practical method for starting at the heart of things and working outward with a sure prediction of the results than hitherto possible.

His paper bears the forbidding title "Quantum Mechanics in Chemistry with Particular Attention to Reactions Involving Conjugate Double Bonds." His friends here say this, "plying with chemistry" is his main "fun."

The paper is a mathematical method of predicting the electro-chemical forces which hold solid matter together—in short what makes it solid. Chemists call this force "valence." It is mainly electrical, an attraction existing between atoms.

and treasurer each by \$500 in Deschutes county.

A joint bill by Senators Zimmerman and Burke and Representatives McPhillips, Duerst and Lewis would have the state share in the property tax delinquencies of counties and provides for taxes to state be payable once each month instead of twice a year.

Creation of an unemployment commission to function in placing unemployed persons on tracts of farm land reclaimed by the state or counties for delinquent taxes and to assist them in financing their operation is the aim of Senate Bill No. 11, by Senator Lee and Representative Beckman.

Two Years for Lease

The commission would consist of the commissioner of labor, the director of agriculture and three members appointed by the governor, and to it would be turned over all the repossessed farm lands. The state, which the commission would parcel out in tracts of not more than 10 acres each to unemployed citizens of the state who have been residents for at least a year.

Out of a fund built up out of an initial appropriation of \$100,000 the commission would be authorized to buy equipment, seed and other necessities to set the beneficiary up in food production, the terms of occupation of the land and repayment of cash advances to be determined by the commission. Leases to individuals would

be for periods of not more than two years.

Beneficiaries of the act could be required by the commission to work not more than two months out of each year on other lands controlled by the commission and for such work would be paid in certificates of credit redeemable in foodstuffs produced by the operation of these farms. Products of these lands could not be sold on the open market, but the commission is authorized to collect, store

and distribute for relief whatever foodstuffs might be produced.

Community Liberal Church Announces New Policies Here

Announcement was made at the Community Liberal church Sunday that the organization is going into branch work, the local church to continue as the general center. The announcement was made in the sermon given upon the occasion of the seventh anniversary of Rev. Ernest M. Whitesmith at the church.

In his sermon, Rev. Mr. Whitesmith said:

smith said: "You may ask me to state in more definite terms what we plan to do. First of all, we must strengthen this local agency through which we are working, this local church. We need make little change in its general purposes which, as adopted more than five years ago, are as follows: The purpose of this organization shall be the mutual aid and counsel of the members in the search for truth, and the advancement of the cause of human welfare and universal brotherhood especially through the following objectives: (1), the emancipation of the human mind from all forms of theological terrorism and taboos which forbid mankind from thinking freely concerning the problems of life; (2), the teaching of people to think and to plan their lives in terms of human service and human welfare and not in terms of selfish gain; (3), the teaching of the unity of mankind, the overcoming of racial hatreds, and the abolition of war; (4), the advancement of the science of human betterment that may give to each a stronger, more intelligent and nobler race of men."

All of this we must learn to translate into terms of home and community living.

"We propose to establish branch organizations in all the surrounding communities, wherever we can find six or eight persons of similar spirit, all of whom shall become, by joining these branches, members of the parent organization. The covenant of membership which our members sign reads as follows: 'To dwell together in peace, to seek truth in freedom, to serve mankind in fellowship, to the end that all souls may grow into harmony with the Divine, this we do covenant with one another.'"

Rev. Mr. Whitesmith announced that on Sunday, Jan. 22, the church would have reception of new members.
