Joe Martineau of Westlake returned from the hospital at Marshfield where he was taken by his uncle, Dewey Jackson, and where he underwent an X-ray examination.

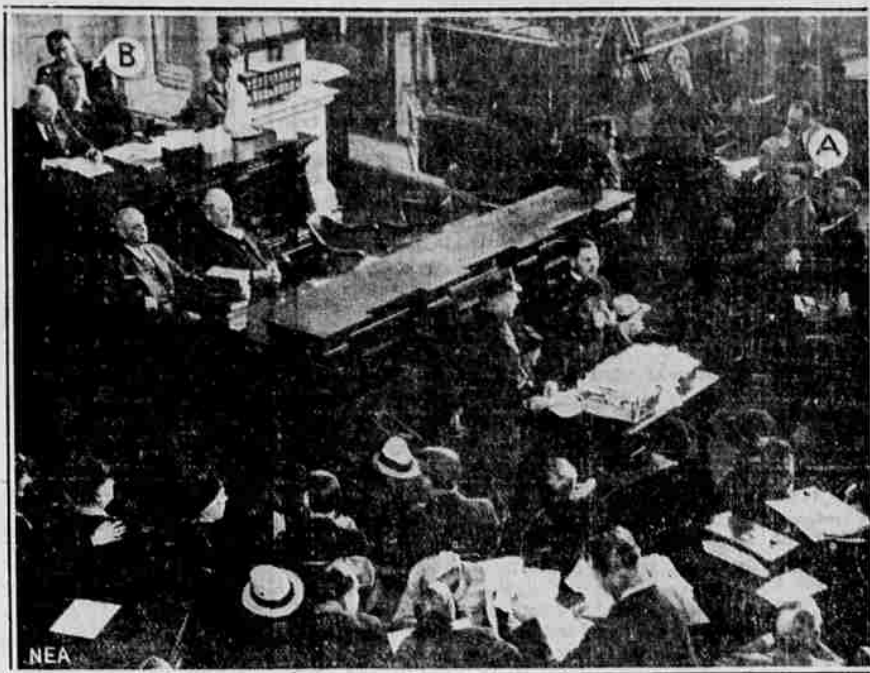
J. T. Miller returned Wednesday of last week from a several days' visit at Gold Hill. He attended the funeral of Marion Morris of Florence on Monday.
