

COUNTY RELIEF PROGRAM SHOWS MUCH WORK DONE

A grand total of 103,366 jars and tins of fruit and vegetables were put up this year for families in need in Lane county through the joint work of the agricultural council, the home demonstration agent's office, and the Red Cross in co-operation with the county. It was announced by O. E. Crowe, county commissioner, who addressed the Rotary club Tuesday noon on "The Welfare Program in Lane County."

Mr. Crowe for the most part quoted figures in his talk, outlining the program of work as carried on from early spring up to the first of November. Through the garden program, planned and carried through by the several co-operating agencies, Lane county had more gardens in than any time in its history the past year, he said.

Thirty-two communities were contacted and committees put to work in this project, teaching the people frugality and to help themselves. An additional canning project was put through, whereby the portable canner took care of surplus fruits and vegetables, and cared for the home-grown produce, thus preserving thousands of pounds of edible foods that would have otherwise wasted and rotted in the fields and orchards, Mr. Crowe said.

Quoting figures up to Nov. 1, Mr. Crowe showed that 30,204 jars of fruit and 35,104 tins of fruit had been put up; while 10,000 jars of vegetables and 25,861 tins of vegetables had been put up. In these figures, in addition, 1837 tins of fish were canned. The grand total on glass jars was 40,804 for fruits and vegetables and 62,502 on tins of fruits and vegetables.

A total of 1672 families participated in this work, representing 8360 persons. A total of 80,850 jars was given out and 49,012 tins. The county took one of every six tins and three of every twelve jars in the fruits and vegetables to be kept in the county store house. A total of 22,804 jars and tins of fruits and vegetables were thus accumulated in the county store-house.

Considerable drying work was done. A total of 21,604 pounds of dried prunes were realized from this project. The Eugene Fruit Growers association doing the drying feat. A total of 2200 boxes of pears were collected from the past orchard season. At Cottage Grove, pears were donated by C. E. Stewart and a total of 3182 cans were canned there and many stored there. Pears given from the Loran orchards were stored in Eugene and 7087 cans were canned for the store-room.

"Lane county has made a name for itself in saving thousands of pounds of fruit and vegetables for the needy that would have otherwise been wasted," Mr. Crowe said, adding that much had been learned from the experience and a much better program could be put through the coming year.

On top of assisting in all this work, the Red Cross has donated the following: 240 dozen stockings, 160 dozen pieces of underwear, 40 dozen trousers and knickerbockers, 40 dozen overalls, seven and one-half dozen jumpers, 2880 sweaters, all amounting to \$5000 in ready-made garments; 800 yards of shirting, 10,000 yards of outing flannel, 7000 yards of gingham, 8000 yards of muslin, 3000 yards of birdseye goods, all amounting to \$3545 in value, or a grand total of \$9535.

In addition, there has been much help from the Red Cross in seeds, a total of 1200 boxes, representing 18 varieties and a valuation of \$1500 given. The national Red Cross also has given out scholarships here amounting to \$1635. In addition, the Red Cross handled the milling and transportation and distribution of flour given by the government to the extent of 150,000 pounds, or a valuation of \$5400. In addition, \$100 was given for jars.

The sum total of Red Cross help has amounted to \$18,170, he said.

Farm Loan Group Elects Officers

The First National Farm Loan association held its annual election of officers Tuesday and chose C. H. Swango of Coburg president. R. B. Thompson of Junction City was the choice for vice-president and C. F. Hyde of Eugene, secretary and treasurer. The board of directors consists of Mr. Swango, E. H. Tinker of Pleasant Hill, Henry F. Smith of Franklin, Bert Johnson of Sagle, R. B. Oldham of Springfield, Mr. Hyde and Mr. Thompson.

The total number of loans carried by the association is 872 and the amount carried is \$1,190,450, the annual report shows.

Chief Technocrat Is Sound Scholar, Says Dr. Cressman; Scott's Position Difficult

A word-picture of Howard Scott, chief of the Technocracy group in New York whose pronouncements a weary, desperate world has seized as a possible "way out" of the depression chaos, is given by Dr. L. S. Cressman of the University of Oregon school of social sciences.

During the four years, 1924-28, when Dr. Cressman knew Scott while he was studying at Columbia university and later teaching at the College of the City of New York, he found the chief of the "Technocrats" a reliable friend and sound scholar, and an engineer interested in his work as an artist and a scientist. Both his intellectual qualities and his character are such as to inspire the confidence of his associates.

Faker Or Genius?
Scott has alternately been declared a bluff and a great genius since Technocracy burst on a be-fogged world. One series of syndicated articles originating in the east and appearing in newspapers all over the country have been particularly derogatory, seeking in Scott's life to find something to discredit him and his theory. This group of articles has of course damaged the prestige of the Technocracy theories, although they admitted the soundness of Scott's ideas. Other articles have made the Technocracy leader a figure to capture the imagination, and have depicted him as the great genius which will lead the world to prosperity and happiness.

Scott is a man of powerful physical build and stands over six feet tall. When he bought a Ford roadster he was forced to have it cut down to make room for his long legs. "He is not bothered much by conventionalities or 'six-bit words,'" Dr. Cressman said in describing the chief of "Technocracy." "He is a charming chap and can talk with considerable authority on many subjects, for he has a tremendous amount of accurate information at his command."

"It is ridiculous that Howard Scott should be called a dilettante," Dr. Cressman declared, adding, "No one would dare call him that to his face."

Not a Dilettante
