

Schissler Assistant Likely To Be New Coach

COLLEGE WILL NOT SEEK "BIG TIME" MENTOR SAYS DEAN

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Oregon State college will make no effort "to go out in the field as a big-time coach" to succeed Paul J. Schissler, Oregon State coach, who resigned today as head football coach at Oregon State college. This statement was made here today by Dean Harry Rogers, chairman of the board of control.

The bad financial situation, he said, did not permit employment of a man demanding a salary as large as the \$8,000 annually Schissler received.

Others at the college believed it more than likely that one of the present coaching staff might be selected as head coach, following the precedent established at University of Oregon where Dr. Clarence W. Spears, succeeded Spears when the latter resigned.

Promotion Likely

Lonny Steiner is line coach at Oregon State college now, assisted by Jim Dixon. Roy Lamb is assistant coach in charge of the backfield, and Vern Eilers directs the freshmen. Steiner did most of the coaching this year. It was assumed that spring practice would be left to these men.

It was recalled today that one of the members of the state board of higher education declared recently that he was "through with high-pressure football," he added "when we can't bring one of our own up from the ranks to a coaching job we had better drop football."

BIG SPORTS CUT MADE AT CORNELL

ITHACA, N. Y., Jan. 11.—(AP)—For reasons of economy, Cornell university has cancelled its entire winter and spring intercollegiate sports program with the single exception of basketball.

This drastic action, taken by the athletic council last night, carries with it abandonment of all schedules, variety and freshness in crew, wrestling, ice hockey, fencing, indoor and outdoor track, baseball and lacrosse, and means that Cornell will not be represented in the intercollegiate rowing association's annual regatta at Poughkeepsie nor in championships in any other sport for the rest of the school year.

The council, at the same time, asked its policy and finance committees to work out a scheme for the "promotion and encouragement of the greatest amount of athletic competition not inconsistent with the terms of its earlier action." This was interpreted to mean that intra-mural sports would be further encouraged and that some informal meets might be held.

Abandonment of the winter and spring sports schedules will have no effect upon the coaching staffs, members of which will be available to athletes for training and instruction although facilities will be greatly curtailed.

BUYING PRICES ON MEDIUM AND LIGHT LEGHORNS ADVANCED
