The senior class of the University high school will present in their high school auditorium Saturday evening at 8:15 o'clock the play that was declared recently by critics to be the hit of San Francisco—"The Queen's Husband."

The play has just ended a run in the bay city and was praised for its clever situations, intriguing plot and sparkling dialogue. The play abounds in difficulties for the stage crew. John Hitebeck, as technical director, has with the aid of a crew of "stage hands," and by the free use of lumber, cloth and draperies, turned the high school stage into a room in a modern royal palace. Fred Smith has been given the job of "sound technician." He and his crew are responsible for the war that occurs just outside the palace doors, no small job in itself. The costuming of the players is under the supervision of Ina Kerley. The fact that the play takes place in an imaginary present-day kingdom presents difficulties in view of the fact the costumes must be regal and at the same time suggest 1933. With the technical end of the play coming along in smooth fashion and the actors conscientiously polishing their roles, "The Queen's Husband" shows promise of a fine performance Saturday night.
