Portland figures, already compiled, show less traffic fatalities in proportion than other sections of the state.

while by no means always of high quality, are an improvement over those prevailing a generation ago. "The recreational devices now existent in so many forms play an important part in giving relief from the monotony of daily toil and adding to the enjoyment of life."

Some of Dr. Steiner's findings regarding sports and other leisure time activities follow:

COLLEGE FOOTBALL—"Can hardly be regarded as a passing fad which will soon give way to something else. The huge investments in stadia, which must be paid for in future years, make almost inevitable the continued approval of the game by college administrative authorities."

PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL—"Already showing the effect of growing competition with other sports and amusements." Major league attendance still rising, but has made no spectacular gains recently and has not kept pace with the population growth in the league cities. Minor leagues are facing "a much more serious situation as far as public support is concerned."

PROFESSIONAL BOXING—"Apparently reached its peak in 1926 and 1927; a sharp decline followed the passing of Dempsey and Tunney."

TENNIS—"Will probably expand until it outranks other athletic sports in the number of players it accommodates."

GOLF—"Expansion may be less rapid in the immediate future, and it is likely that golf will tend to remain a sport to be enjoyed by a limited number of people."

HUNTING AND FISHING—"May in the near future die out as popular sports for the general public."

FRATERNAL SOCIETIES—"Are reaching the peak of their development and are now facing a decline as leisure time institutions."

LUNCHEON CLUBS—"Movement appears to be still on the upward trend, but the slightly smaller membership increases, during recent years, lead one to the belief that it is approaching its zenith."

CARD PLAYING—"The production of playing cards increased nearly three times during the past 20 years and has made a gain of 27 per cent since 1920."

MOVING PICTURES—"Apparently a necessary luxury, slow to die out in the family budget."

"The effort to keep pace with new types of recreation has discouraged thrift and increased the cost of living," Dr. Steiner says in commenting on some of the problems of leisure time use.

Sees Danger in Desire to Win
"The extraordinary desire to win games at all costs rather than to enjoy sport for sport's sake," he continues, "makes heavy demands upon energy and frequently turns play into work."

"The great concentration of interest in modern sports and amusements tends to force into the background, at least for large numbers of people, the leisure time activities of an intellectual and cultural nature."

He indicates a need for more municipal park space. The preservation of more wilderness areas, stricter enforcement of game laws, more effective efforts in developing game farms and fish hatcheries, the greater utilization of school buildings and grounds after school hours, development of public recreational facilities on a regional basis and better governmental supervision and control of commercial amusements.

REV. MR. RISTOW IS SPEAKER FOR CLUB

By means of straightening out disagreements through law, working towards disarmament, and building public opinion that is exploitation-proof, the world can work out a program to outlaw war, said Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, president of the local Council for Prevention of War, and pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, in a talk before the Eugene Business and Professional Women's club Thursday noon at the Ostrander hotel.

Rev. Mr. Ristow declared war has been with the world too long, that it is the last stand of anarchy. Both militarists and pacifists agree that war is an evil, but there are two different viewpoints as to how to overcome this evil. The militarists say to avoid war, be prepared for it; during peace time, concentrate on war. The pacifists hold that interests must center on peace; in time of peace prepare for peace. The viewpoint of the pacifist is more perfect, a more truly psychological viewpoint, the speaker pointed out. A doctor does not concentrate on preparing a patient for diphtheria but on preparing for health. In the same way the sick world is doctored by concentration on the state of health, rather than on conflict.

Rev. Mr. Ristow then outlined the program and purposes of the Council for Prevention of War.

The next meeting of the club comes on January 26. On the coming Sunday, a group from the local club will be going to Monmouth to attend a district conference. Dr. A. M. Smith, president of the local club, and Mrs. Ella T. Edmondson, chairman of the legislative committee, are on the conference program to speak.

2 STATES SUFFER FROM BAD WEATHER

(By The Associated Press)

Two widely separated states—Minnesota and California—today surveyed the results of death dealing weather in the form of a blizzard, sub-zero temperatures and gales.

While the north country was digging itself out of snow-blocked highways and recording at least three deaths which came with mercury readings as low as 17 degrees below zero, southern California was counting the damage and loss of life it sustained from an 80-mile gale.

In way of contrast New York lolled in its warmest Jan. 11 in history yesterday with the thermometer at 38 degrees above zero. Chicago and the middle west had winter temperatures but no snow.

In California reports said the wind, viciously blowing through orange groves and acres of oil well derricks, had claimed at least two lives and caused property damage approaching a million dollars.

The rescue of eight naval men adrift in motor boats averted a larger death toll. Of two drownings, one was Lieutenant-Commander Carl Hupp, swept overboard from the U. S. cruiser Raleigh.
