

MICHIGAN COACH ACCUSES JAPS OF DOPING SWIMMERS

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Jan. 13.—(AP)—Matt Mann, coach of University of Michigan's national collegiate championship swimming team, today announced a "war against doping" of amateur swimmers, such as, he said, "was done by the Japanese in the 1932 Olympic Games."

Mann said it is established that "oxygen or some stimulant" was administered to Japanese swimmers within ten minutes of the time they entered the water for finals of the races at Los Angeles last summer. Japanese men won five of the six races. Their victories generally were credited to a new Nipponese stroke for the free style, but Mann pointed out that they also won the backstroke and breaststroke events, and that their times were considerably better than in trials for places on Japan's team.

To Make Report
Robert Kipnuth, of Yale, coach of the United States Olympic swimming team, and Coach Mann are acting as a sub-committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association swimming committee to report on alleged "doping" at the committee's next meeting, March 24 and 25 at New Haven, Conn. Mann said western conference swimming coaches already have ruled against administering oxygen to swimmers, "to forestall the danger of the practice spreading in this country." A similar rule will be sought in the N. C. A. A., he said.

University of Michigan medical men said administering oxygen, just before a race would not produce greater speed "except possibly by the effect on the minds of the athletes." Dr. Frank Lynam, physician of the athletic department, said any physical effect "would last only for a breath or two if at all."

Coach Mann said giving oxygen "or any dope" should be prevented, "because it is unethical, regardless of harmful effects."
