It was Oregon's first conference game.

Saturday night the teams met again at McArthur court at 7:30 o'clock.

The tall, rangy Washington State lads led the lead at the start, rolling up 11 points before the Webfoots could connect with the basket. After Oregon got started they were never able to threaten the lead of the Cougars.

At half time the score was 22 to 11 for the Pullman boys and in the final period they proceeded to work it up to the final score. The Oregon team burst through the Cougar defense for several points in the final period, but the skyscraping forwards of Washington State nearly always recovered at the back board and worked the ball back to their end of the floor where they passed back and forth waiting for an opportunity to score. FREDDIE MILLER TAKES TITLE BOUT

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Freddie Miller, slender southpaw from Cincinnati's Rhineland, today at last had caught up with the will of the wispy featherweight championship.

On his third try for the title—at least as far as the national boxing association is concerned—he collected himself after a bad start to take the crown from Tommy Paul of Buffalo, N. Y., by a decision victory in 10 rounds at the Chicago stadium. Friday the thirteenth may have had something to do with it, but Miller's rugged campaign, once he was started, would have taken care of the situation on any day of the week.

It was Paul's first battle in defense of the title he won in an N. B. A. tournament at Detroit last year, and for three rounds, he appeared thoroughly capable of hanging onto it. Walking away from Miller's southpaw shots, he fired away with a straight right to chin and jaw that earned him a substantial margin. He reached the back of his effort in the third when the right arm of Miller flying into the ropes, well shaken.

Disputed Middle Weight Title Is Partly Ben Jeby's

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Ben Jeby, durable east side Hebrew, today held one leg on the disputed middle-weight championship of the world.

Jeby stopped Frankie Battaglia of Winnipeg in the 12th round of a 15-round match in Madison Square Garden last night and earned official championship recognition from the New York State Athletic commission. His title claim, however, is far from clear for Marcel Tili of France is recognized as 160-pound title-holder by the National Boxing Association.

Battaglia, who had knocked out Jeby in a single round in an earlier bout, had little or no chance with the New York star last night once Jeby floored him with a terrific left to the head in the second round and then landed a left hook to the face a few seconds later that burst a blood vessel under Battaglia's right eye.

Mortgage Change Groups Planned

SALEM, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Creation of voluntary farm mortgage adjustment committees for Oregon and the respective counties was voted at the farm mortgage meeting here yesterday with Paul V. Maris, director of federal cooperative extension, in charge.

Farmers union members, state grange members, bankers and other state leaders attended and voted to pattern the Oregon plan after those in vogue in other states, particularly Iowa and Ohio.

The group yesterday went on record to take policies out of the new move, when it passed a motion "that the primary function of the state and county mortgage adjustment committees be to seek favorable adjustments between borrower and lender, rather than to participate in legislative activities."

Liquor Arrests Show Reduction

SALEM, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Sentences totaling 92 years were meted out to violators arrested during the month of December by the state police, the report of Charles P. Pray for that month revealed. The 290 arrests for major violations also included one for murder. A total of \$4852 in fines was also assessed.

Liquor law violations, as a result of the repeal of the dry law enabling set have been reduced greatly. Violations of liquor laws formerly led in the number of arrests and fines, but during December the number of arrests fell to 10 and fines to \$375. However, fines for drunkenness, of which there were 26 arrests made, totaled \$417.

shoulder in defense of a system of advantage."

The bankers, whom Scott referred to as "debt merchants," heard him calmly. Although Scott denied technocracy was trying to say "There is going to be chaos or there is going to be doom," Jefferson Seligman, of Seligman Brothers, bankers, found Scott's views "rather gloomy."

Picture "Pretty True"
"It is a great thing to think about," he said, "I have great respect for Mr. Scott but I think his views are rather gloomy. He seems to feel the end of the world is coming. His opinions leave me bewildered. Technocracy offers a liberative field for thought and speculation; it embraces many fields, philosophy, sociology and economics."

Frank A. Vanderlip, former president of the National City bank, found the findings of technocracy "a pretty true picture." He said, however, he would reserve judgment until more official material was published.

Lionel D. Edie, economist, complained criticism of technocracy was virtually impossible because it was "difficult to know when a man really represented technocracy—there are too many unofficial spokesmen for the 'White House.'"

Two Years to Tell
Scott, a tall man with a wry smile who smokes cigarettes fast and often, said, "We are not bothering to reply to critics. We don't have to." He said that "Conditions in the next two years on this continent will determine who is correct."

He declared, according to a stenographic transcription, that "We are in that unique situation that technocracy receiving the attention of the world it is now going to be used, at least the attempt is going to be made to use technocracy, not by those within technocracy itself, but by your present politician and your debt merchants are going to pose technocracy as one of the propositions that will necessitate a state politically which would be so grave that an institutional fascism will be proposed under the guise of dictatorial prerogatives of the incoming president."

The meeting was held under the auspices of the Society of Arts and Sciences.

Economics Good As Bridge
"Technocracy," he said, "speaking tonight from the continental division 7340, wishes to be perfectly understood that this has broken upon it like nothing else that has happened to any similar organization, you might say, in the memory of man."

"Months ago, we were a quiet, unknown, non-profit organization, which in the year 1932 has expended less than \$12500 and received not more than \$300 outside of the subscriptions of its members. It has written 14,000 words. Those 14,000 words, to judge from the results, are the most potent 14,000 that have been written in action and interest and curiosity are on this continent any judge of results."

A member of the audience sent Scott a written question, reading: "Does technocracy function to administer the laws of economics?"

"That's a funny question," said Scott. "Economics hasn't much to recommend it. It's not good as a bridge, though, I guess. It's a good way to show the futility of the debt system. I'm not answering such questions as that. Technocracy doesn't have to. We're not prima donnas. We haven't any public. The question is, are we correct? Not what we are going to do."

A survey of the audience was made after the meeting by the New York Times, which reported that in general most of Scott's hearers were disappointed with what they regarded as a confused presentation and were skeptical of Mr. Scott as an engineer who had failed to be explicit concerning the new social order which he regarded as necessary.

Gano Dunn, president of the J. G. White Engineering corporation, said: "I resent the claims to science and engineering made by the technocrats when their methods are so distinctly contrary to the methods of science and engineering. Mr. Scott has just said, 'We do not bother with critics,' a statement which no man who is a scientist or an engineer could ever make."

The Times says that many of those present had definite views, in most cases uncompromising, but declined to be quoted. One well known banker remarked bitterly that Mr. Scott "certainly was selling America short."

Edie, a former professor of finance at the University of Chicago, said the energy system which technocracy would substitute for the price system was itself a price system using eggs and joules instead of gold. He challenged the accuracy of Scott's figures in general and asked why they were not published so that steel figures might be examined by the steel corporation, telephone figures examined by the telephone company, and so on.
