

THEATER REDUCES ADMITTANCE PRICE EFFECTIVE SUNDAY

A 25 per cent reduction in prices at the Fox McDaniel theater is announced by Ray W. Jones, manager, today. The new price scale, effective Sunday, places the price of admission anywhere from 25 cents to 25 cents, children 10 cents.

Mr. Jones says the cut will in no way affect the standard of pictures which he believes the new price will meet the approval of all Eugene and Lane county.
