

Bunny Martin And Rob Roy Rematched Eggs Down Wholesale;

EX-WELTER CHAMP IS GIVEN CHANCE TO AVENGE DEFEAT

Lovers of clean, scientific wrestling will be pleased with the announcement that Rob Roy, Scottish terror, is to lock horns again with Bunny Martin, ex-national welterweight amateur champion.

Unlike some wrestlers, however, Martin does not plan to seek his vengeance by kicking Rob Roy in the stomach, but he plans to pin the Scot to the mat with one of his many clever holds.

Owen has not announced the supporting card.

Every thing Red does is magnificent, whether it's shooting a long basket or permitting his opponent to get away for a set-up. He is the only player we know who gets a hand from his followers regardless of whether his play is good or bad. Rotenberg, like the little girl with the curl in the middle of her forehead, is very, very good when he is good, and when he is bad he is horrid. But there is color in every move Red makes and the crowd loves him.

Cap Roberts, whose real name is Charles Edwin, has been playing his usual stellar game this year though in the Saturday game his basketball shooting eye was off. "Snook" Robertson, tall guard, was not in good health last week, but managed to find the basket in the second game. Olinger, small forward, reminds many followers of little Billy Keenan. He was high point man for his team Saturday though Roberts was high the night before. Watts, the other starting forward, shows promise of good play. Miller, starting guard, did not make a foul in either game. Simmons, reserve guard, tries hard and may come along fast. HUSKY HOOPSTERS AT TOP AS USUAL IN NORTHERN LOOP

In their first two appearances the champions of five seasons crushed Idaho, 70-27, and 62-35. The Idaho team is no weakling, having been nosed out by one point and five points respectively in two games with the strong Oregon Staters.

Washington State and Oregon State, tied in second place with three wins and one loss each, will try to decide at Corvallis tonight and Tuesday whose turn it is to knock the Huskies from their perch.

With each having played a quarter of its schedule, a double loss would put one of them almost out of the running.

The Cougars are favored, having easily trimmed Oregon in two games while the Beavers were having trouble beating the Vandals.

Bill Reinhardt's Webfoots lacked spark against the Cougars and are expected to bite off a tremendous chunk when the Huskies arrive in Eugene for the game Friday.

Rich Fox's Vandals will rest until Saturday night, when they will entertain the Cougars.

In the South University of California's champions are still unbeaten, as are their southern pals, the Trojans.

St. Mary's Quint To Play Lowell

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 16.—(AP)—William A. Spinks, 67, who founded a fortune by developing the idea of a small cube of chalk for billiard and pool cues, died here yesterday.

Spinks was a nationally recognized billiard player and was several times world champion. He was born in San Jose, Cal., the son of Dr. and Mrs. William A. Spinks. He was also one of the pioneer California oil developers and was an authority on the growing of avocados.

His estate in the Duarte foothills is one of the show places of Southern California.

Mikkleson Sets New Ski Record

GARY, Ind., Jan. 16.—(AP)—American-born skier had a new record to jump at today after Roy Mikkleson of Auburn, Cal., leaped 176 feet down the Norge ski slide during the 27th annual tournament conducted by that club.

The class A championship of the Central Ski association, however, went for the fourth successive year to Casper Olmen, Minn. N. D., star who captained the United States Olympic team last summer. His perfect form in executing jumps of 164 and 174 feet won him the title.

"We were about to order his discharge from the hospital when a final inspection showed his tonsils infected to an extreme degree," said Dr. O'Neal. "So we had them out, and it will make a new man of him."

Eggs Down Wholesale; Stocks Rally, Then Drop

PRICES CUT FROM 2 TO 3 CENTS IN LIST HERE MONDAY

As forecast in the Register-Guard market reports of Saturday evening, egg prices dropped here wholesale Monday, from two to three cents. Extras slid down two cents to 22, mediums dropped three cents to 22, and crabs are down to 20 cents. Both the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers' association and Swift and company reported their wholesale lists lower.

New York grades continue unchanged.

Store buying prices showed corresponding drops, but owing to the fact that farmers are bringing plentiful supplies of eggs in to sell at any price at the stores, the store prices are showing considerable variation.

Butter, butterfat, livestock and grains all remained unchanged.

Not much further damage is looked for from the below freezing weather since there is little left to damage since the cold spell of mid-December. Fall grains, shrubs, and what crops were in the group were badly damaged in December.

CHEESE AND EGG PRICES ARE CUT

PORTLAND, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Cut of 1c lb. in the price of Tillamook cheese effective immediately, was a reflection of the extreme weakness forced in the market generally as a result of continued price shading by the intermountain and eastern markets.

The cut makes triplets 13c and loaf 14c lb. f. o. b. Tillamook which means 15 and 16c respectively to retailers at Portland in box lots.

Market for butter continues to reflect more or less weakness as a result of the recent record price slashes considering the season. The movement into storage has been well started as a result.

Cuts of 2 to 3c dozen in the price of eggs finally forced by the local co-ops as a result of continued underselling by private firms and outside interests, has left the trade in a rather weak position. Receipts show seasonable increase.

Market for country killed meats showed a steady tone for the week's opening with practically all supplies cleaned up over the week-end. Demand is good in all lines except canned corn.

Unchanged prices continue in the market for live chickens with no general change for the week's opening, but not affected chickens although the increase of the turkey market has not affected chickens although the former are much the cheapest.
