KUNKLE UNABLE TO PLAY BUT OREGON OUTLOOK BRIGHTER



ERMIT STEVENS, who with Captain Roberts, is the only two-year letterman on the University of Oregon basketball squad, has rejoined the team and will be able to get into the crucial series with the Washington Huskies here Friday and Saturday night.

Friday night's game will start at 8:15 instead of the customary 7:30 with a preliminary between St. Mary's Catholic high school and the Oregon freshmen preceding it and starting at 7 o'clock. Saturday's game will start the usual 7:30.

The Oregon team looks better in practice than it did last week. Roberts, Robertson and Watts—all three regulars—who have been slowly recovering from the flu, are getting stronger and are able to take on more strenuous practice. Reinhardt, however, is not working them too hard yet, because he feels that they are not yet in shape to stand the gauntlet of the Washington Huskies.

Big Ed Kunkle, sophomore forward on the team, seems to be definitely out of the Husky series. Kunkle injured his leg more than a month ago and has not yet fully recovered. The Webfoots hope to give the Champion Husky a close battle.

Get set for a flock of new track records during the coming indoor season. American spectators will see more new track records set than in any other year in the sport's history. This is not because there are more great athletes ready to perform than ever before, but because the Amateur Athletic union recently abandoned yardage measurement and switched to metric distances used in foreign countries.

The metric system was used during the Olympic games and the American track heads decided this would be a good time to standardize our system of measurement. While there are world records for every metric distance on the short, there are no accepted records for this measurement in American indoor meets, which have been held on the yardage basis in the past. Consequently, you'll see new marks set in many meets.

The runners may have a hard time adjusting themselves to the new distances but that will be worked out in time. Here is the metric table, for the benefit of track fans:

EGGS CUT 3 CENTS; SITUATION SAID BAD

PORTLAND, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The cut of 3¢ dozen which went into effect at the Portland plant of the Pacific Co-ops today was only an answer to determined efforts of outsiders to undersell the local producers irrespective of how low the market is. Continued shading of prices by outsiders is being discounter to the Portland trade, according to the Journal. Local interests are making an effort to undersell the outsiders and wreck the market in the latter's home territory, because of the desire to tear down Portland is being made the dumping ground for outside eggs.

All Eggs Cut Here; Stock Market Slump

BIG CUTS MADE WEDNESDAY FOR ALL EGG LISTS

All egg prices leaped down the scale here Wednesday with drastic cuts, following similar drops in Portland.

As forecast in Tuesday night's Register-Guard, wholesale prices were cut three cents, both the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers' association and Swift and company listing them down to 21 cents on extras, 19 cents on mediums, and 18 cents on crabs.

New York grades quoted by Swift and company were cut four cents on extras, the extras being quoted now at 20 cents, standards at 18 cents, firsts and mediums at 16 cents, and second at 14 cents.

Some of the wildest cuts were among the store buying prices. Already quoting below the market before the big cuts came, store prices were listed at all kinds of quotations Wednesday. Standards were quoted from 15 to 18 cents generally, although it is likely they were lower in some lists, and mediums at 13 to 16 cents.

The lowered prices on eggs are likely to bring a greater movement of poultry onto the market with resultant changes are anticipated in the poultry quotations.

Butter and butterfat remained unchanged following the boost of Tuesday.
