

PAGEANT PLANS WILL BE TALKED ON JANUARY 24

ers, in announcing the meeting of the association. "With our county fair unlikely this year, the city playground activity greatly curtailed, there is little for the community to take interest in during the coming year."

Scenery, Costumes on Hand
"By holding this pageant this summer, making it a community event at very low cost, it should appeal to the entire community as a project greatly worth while."

Mr. Rogers pointed out that the scenery prepared for the last pageant is in the hands of the association and could be used again this year. In addition, several hundred costumes are on hand and Cal Koonce stated the pioneer accessories such as stage coaches and old wagons are ready at hand.

The directors of the Pageant association are Mr. Rogers, Dr. James H. Gilbert, Joseph H. Koke, R. C. Callahan, Lynn S. McCready, Frank McAllister and Jack Magruder. The directors will discuss the matter and if the plan is deemed feasible, the community will be asked for an expression of opinion on the project.

Emphasize Pageant
Hugh Rosson, who managed the last pageant, stated Wednesday that the pageant was too valuable a thing to give up and that if a sensible budget could be worked out whereby the more costly items such as parades and the like were eliminated, the project would be practical.

"The emphasis should be placed directly on the pageant itself, I believe, the community organizing to preserve the institution of the show and leaving the frills out of the picture," Mr. Rosson said. "The reputation of the pageant is such that it would not be necessary to rely upon attendance from outside a radius of 100 miles of this city to assure gate receipts which would make the affair nearly self-supporting. I am very much in favor of continuing the pageant and will be glad to co-operate in any way to make the project a success should it be held this summer."

Time Held Ideal
"This is the ideal time to present a pioneer pageant, embodying the essentials of the pioneer spirit which have gone so far in making the other shows the successes they were," declared W. F. G. Thacher, author of the last pageant, in commenting on the plan Wednesday. "If this community would get behind this project and sponsor this pageant, eliminating all expensive features and making it purely a community enterprise, it would establish Eugene in a position unequalled in any other city of the United States."

"There would be many ways of reducing the costs to a minimum. Sewing circles and women's groups could prepare costumes and other material needed for the show. Local talent could handle the various parts. I can see no reason why this community cannot present as fine a show as the other two pageants without draining the finances of the community."

Evans Favors Idea
Stating that if the disposition of the people were favorable, the pageant certainly should be held this year, John Stark Evans, who wrote much of the music and directed the singing in the other two pageants, declared himself heartily in favor of the plan. "It is well worth a thorough investigation and consideration because of the fact that such a project, absorbing the interest of the community, as it would, would be of inestimable benefit to the city and county," he declared.

Mr. Evans stressed the point that individuals of the community must support such a project wholeheartedly, even to the point of arranging their vacations so that they could participate in the show.

If the directors of the Pageant association find the plan feasible, it is likely that a public meeting will be called at which time the citizens of this community will be asked to express their opinion on holding the pageant, Mr. Rogers said. Members of the association feel it imperative to get the project underway as soon as possible since considerable time is necessary in preparing the show.

elg countries is in serious competition with home products because of origin in countries which do not maintain as high a standard of living as the United States and have a depreciated or deflated currency.

Legislation affecting length and catching of Oregon crabs was introduced in the house Wednesday morning, the bill bearing the name of Representatives Hilton and Bennett. The bill, which refers to the crustaceans in Alsea bay and river, prohibits catching male and female crabs under seven inches. Methods of catching the crabs other than by open crab nets are prohibited.

The former legal length was 6 1/2 inches.

A bill introduced by Senators Burke, Williamson and McFadden would reduce the salary of the secretary of state board of control to a maximum of \$3000. William Elzing, the present secretary, received \$7000, and had accepted the board reduction to \$5,000 this year.

W. L. Malone, of the Singer staff,

said the raid climaxed a half year's bitter labor dispute. He declared that between 150 and 200 former Singer employees mostly transported in motor cars, rushed Singer's two-story office building in the heart of Yokohama's business district during the lunch hour.

Truck Brings Clubs

The majority, he said, wielded cordwood clubs, of which a motorcar-load was dumped in front of the building at the outset of the attack, Malone said at least one knife was used.

The rioters swept through the building like a wrecking crew, smashing furniture and demolishing typewriters and other machines. Safes were damaged, documents torn and scattered and doors and windows were smashed.

Comparatively few persons were injured because only a few employees were in the building at lunch time. Most of these sought refuge on the roof.

The rioters carried on the wrecking operations nearly 20 minutes before police arrived. Bloodstains on the floors and desks testified to the violence. Yokohama is the site of the only large Singer branch in Japan operating at present. Osaka and Kobe branches were closed in November as the result of harassment by strikers and alleged inadequate police protection. Singers officials said strikers were occupying the company premises at Osaka and Wajoga and that police failed to eject them.
