

Townies To Open Season Against Schapp's Nine on Fairgrounds Today

LADIES WILL BE ADMITTED FREE TO OPENING CONTEST

The Eugene Townies, official city baseball club, will open their season on the fairgrounds today at 2:30 o'clock against Schapp's of Portland. With fair weather promised, the opening is planned as one of the most auspicious in Eugene's history.

Mayor Elisha Large will pitch the first ball with Chief Bergman receiving. Ed Morris, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce will do the hitting with Fred Olson, manager of the Northwest Cities Gas company, umpiring. Sheet Manerud has designed a bat with which Morris will be unable to miss, he says. Manerud is chairman of the opening day committee.

A new feature will be music before the game and at various intervals. Those who come early will enjoy the concert.

The Eugene team will go on the field with none too much practice. However, most of the players are pretty well experienced. The pitching assignment will probably fall to Bob Wiltshire, a lanky right-hander, who it is expected, will give a good account of himself this year.

The catching assignment will be handled by Lawrence Stenschoel, or Roy Shaneman.

The infield will be made up of Charles Wirth, Del Russell, John Londahl, Hugh Mercer, Jack Gordon, Jack being a brother of the University of Oregon freshman star, and Donald Husband.

In the outfield will probably be found Cotter Gould at right field, J. Van Duren at center and Nig Hamerickson and Carl Inman at left. There is a possibility that either Hugh Mercer or Jack Gordon, or both, will be shifted to the outfield.

Nothing is known very definitely about the Portland team except that they played off with Westside last year for championship.

The admission price has been reduced to 25 cents, and ladies will be admitted at least to this game free.

OREGON FRESHMEN LOSE TO ROOKS IN ANNUAL DUAL MEET

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 27.—(AP)—The Oregon State College Rooks swamped the University of Oregon freshmen 80 to 42, in the annual freshman dual track and field meet here today. Two meet records were bettered. Guggisberg of the Rooks stepped the mile in 4:28.8, bettering the former record of 4:32.6 held by Bryant of the Rooks. Schapp of the Fresh made the half-mile in 1:50.8, compared with the old record of 2:02, jointly held by Twitchell and White of the Rooks.

The Oregon State freshmen took first place in 12 of the 14 events, with the Oregon freshmen taking first in only the shotput and half mile. Wilbur Kidder of Pendleton for the Rooks was high point man with 19 points, made by three firsts, a second and a third.
