Dr. Spence, Eugene Surgeon, Stricken

Practitioner Succumbs To Illness; Had Travelled Quite Widely

Dr. H. S. Spence, who had been a resident of Eugene since 1913, died suddenly at his home, 1700 Alder street, at 9 o'clock Sunday evening. He had been in ill health for some time and had been in the hospital for a few days.

Dr. Spence was born December 29, 1870, in Austin, Texas. He was the son of Judge Joseph and Mrs. Margaret Spence. He entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University, New York City, where he was graduated with the degree of doctor of medicine in 1897. In 1900 and 1901 he received his medical degree from the University of Texas, where he was graduated in 1907. In 1908 and 1909 he received his medical degree from the University of California, where he was graduated in 1913.

Dr. Spence was a member of the Medical Society of Oregon, the Oregon Medical Association, the American Medical Association, and the Willamette Valley Medical Society. He was also a member of the Eugene Chapter of the Red Cross, the Eugene Chapter of the United States Army Medical Reserve, and the Eugene Chapter of the United States Navy Medical Reserve.

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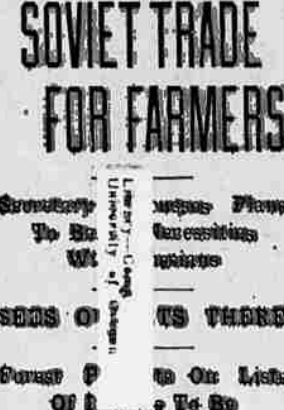
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ZION IS BANKRUPT!

CHICAGO, May 29.—(AP)—The Zion institutions and industries, including religious and commercial operations, were placed in receivership today by Federal Judge James H. Wilcox.

WALLACE ASKS SOVIET TRADE FOR FARMERS

Secretary Urges Soviet Trade For Farmers

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace yesterday urged that consideration be given to a plan for leasing portions of land now planted to cotton and sugarcane in exchange for Soviet trade goods. He estimated that the cost of such a plan would be about \$100,000,000 for this purpose in payments to growers would have the effect of maintaining cotton prices at from 10 to 12 cents per pound.

Wallace said former Senator Brookhart of Iowa, selected Saturday as special trade advisor for the new administration, was chosen for his knowledge of Russia and its trade possibilities.
