

Thunderbolt To Vie With Wild Bull Tonight

Thor Jensen, breathing thunder and lightning, arrived in town Thursday morning for his match with Wild Bull Stansky at the armory tonight on Herb Owen's card. Jensen has a grudge to settle with Stansky, so he says, and he predicts a dire fate for the evil-doer. Regardless of whether he ever meets the sailor again, the match with Stansky should furnish enough of that elusive combination, speed, cleverness, and gore, to satisfy any fan. Neither boy is noted for his gentlemanly tactics in the ring, and both are clever wrestlers.

That the meet with Stansky is really a grudge affair is attested by the fact that Jensen has nothing to gain in prestige by a victory. Jensen beat Clingman, and Clingman beat Stansky, but this does not keep the Orator from hummering and thrashing after the Wild Bull's blood.

Anson Cornell Made New Pacific Coach

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Anson Cornell, former University of Oregon football star and for the past 17 years head coach at the College of Idaho at Caldwell, is the new director of athletics and head coach at Pacific University of Forest Grove, Dr. John F. Dobbs, president of the latter institution, announced Cornell's appointment last night.

Cornell will succeed Eldon Jenne who resigned to return to his old coaching position at Washington High, Portland.

Cornell is a graduate of Washington high school, where he began his football career which took him to Eugene where he was quarterback under Hugo Bezdek for three years and captain of the Oregon eleven in 1915.

Yankee Aces Lead In All-Star Poll

CHICAGO, June 1.—(AP)—Lou Gehrig, Babe Ruth and Bill Dickey of the world champion Yankees, Joe Cronin, Washington's young manager, Bob Grove of the Athletics, and Al Simmons of the Chicago White Sox, apparently are certain of places on the American league team which will tackle National league stars at Comiskey park July 6.

Gehrig had a lead of 20,880 to 7,782 for Jimmy Fox in the voting to select a first baseman. Dickey led the catchers with a total of 21,091 to 12,525 for Philadelphia's Mickey Cochrane. Simmons paced the outfielders with 23,303, the largest total for any position, with Ruth second with 24,230. Grove had piled up 25,104 votes to lead the pitchers. Cronin's 20,446 gave him a wide lead over the rest of the shortstops.

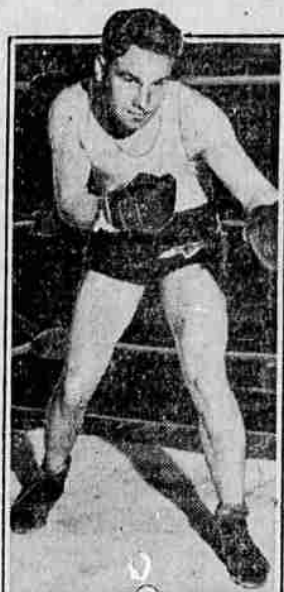

BASE HITS MANY IN COAST LEAGUE

Coast league pitchers had occasion again today to wonder if there will be an end to the 1933 barrage of base hits that has kept six team averages at or above the .300 mark. Yesterday's four games yielded a total of 111 safeties.

Portland's mound staff had as much trouble as any. Lou Koupal, Sid Cohen, Carl Boone and Art Jacobs all trying to stop a Los Angeles attack that netted 14 hits and a 9-0 victory. Leroy Herrmann was touched for 6 hits and 4 runs in the fifth but otherwise was not in trouble. He hit a double and a pair of singles to help his own game.

Seattle captured the day's heaviest slugfest from San Francisco, 13-12, getting 20 singles to 18 for the Seals. Preparing for "George Burns Night" this evening, the Indians manager lined up his fifth single of the game in the ninth to drive in the winning run. Leo Osterberg accounted for 7 San Francisco runs with two circuit walk-ups and a single. Chick Ellsworth, Seattle shortstop, also hit a four-bagger.

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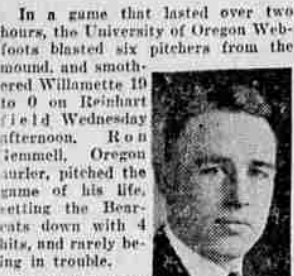
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WEBFOOTS TAKE TRACK MEET BY 19 TO 0 SCORE

In a game that lasted over two hours, the University of Oregon Webfoots blasted six pitchers from the mound, and smothered Willamette 19 to 0 on Wednesday afternoon. Ron Gemmell, Oregon pitcher, pitched the game of his life, setting the Bearcats down with 4 hits, and rarely being in trouble.

Oregon first scored in the opening inning. Bill Reinhardt, Oregon's star pitcher, crossed the plate after being safe on an error. Lee Chester's single, the first hit of the game, scored him, Oregon went down one, two, three in the second inning, and in the third, but in the fourth the procession started. With two outs, Chatterton was hit by a pitched ball, and he led a parade that netted 8 runs before the final out was made.

The Webfoots got two more in the fifth, and eight more in the sixth. In the seventh Spee Keene, Willamette coach, because the Bearcat's seventh pitcher, with Bill Reinhardt, Oregon pitcher, receiving. The game was officially over, giving Gemmell a 19 to 0 shut-out, but in the remaining two innings, three Willamette runs crossed the plate, while Keene held the Oregon hitters scoreless.

GOING IS TOUGH, PIRATES DISCOVER

With the improvement in the form of their western rivals, the St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs, the league leading Pittsburgh Pirates have found the going considerably tougher in the National league.

Pittsburgh couldn't do a thing with the pitching of Charley Root yesterday and Chicago handed the Pirates a 5-1 defeat, took the series three games to two and left the losers in a virtual tie with St. Louis for the league lead. The Cards were idle yesterday after running their winning streak to six straight. The triumph, the seventh in the last eight games for the Cubs, left them one game and a half behind the third place New York Giants.

The other two National league games scheduled yesterday, Brooklyn at New York and Boston at Philadelphia, both were halted by wet grounds.

The leading American league struggle, the New York Yankees against the second place Washington Senators, remained unchanged as they split a doubleheader that concluded their series. Washington took the opening slugfest 12 to 7 and the Yankees came back in the second clash, piling up eight runs in the first two frames and standing off the Senators' closing rush to win 9-7.

The two teams accumulated 49 hits, good for 75 bases. In the two games and eleven pitchers saw service, eight in the first game.

All the other American league clubs had an open date.

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Local baseball fans who have been dissatisfied with the brand of ball the Webfoots have displayed in the past were amply repaid by Wednesday's exhibition. They saw Reinhardt's men complete a snappy double play, make a number of sensational catches, and unlimber the until now dormant bats to crack out 14 base hits. Up to the seventh inning, it was a potentially good Oregon baseball team blooming into full power. From there on it became a two reel comedy, with Coach Spee Keene and Coach Billy Reinhardt the featured players.

Keene had seen 6 of his pitchers unceremoniously sent to the showers when the seventh rolled around, so the not so old major-domo of Salem athletics began to warm up himself. But his rival mentor could not bear to see him do it alone. "You pitch and I'll catch," called Bill Reinhardt, and the proposal was instantly accepted. And Spee, with Bill's able assistance, did what no Willamette pitcher had been able to do, setting down the locals two straight innings without a run.

Thor Jensen, the Elktion Thunderbolt, is stepping into one, Thor flatly refused to wrestle Otis Clingman this week, and suggested that Herb Owen put him on with Wild Bull Stansky instead. Owen obligingly did so, but if Thor throws the Bull, a match with Clingman will be indicated. And Thor will have a great deal more difficulty wiggling out of it, this time. Clingman is anxious to get another crack at the Elktion speed-maker, but is not complaining about his loss last week. If Owen puts them on next Thursday, Jensen will be given an opportunity to show local fans that he can really "take" it, as well as dish it out.

PAUL STARR TO RUN AT CHICAGO

Oregon's Paul Starr, greatest dash man of the northwest, and probably the outstanding 220 runner of the coast, will go to the national intercollegiate track meet at Chicago, it was announced Thursday by Bill Bowerman, who was in charge of a ticket sale to raise money for the trip. Starr may be accompanied by Col. Bill Hayward, veteran Oregon track coach. Hayward has not definitely decided to make the trip, but it is probable that he will go. The Order of the "O," campus letterman's organization, sponsored the ticket sale, and raised about \$150 by it. The senior class, of which Starr is a member, subscribed \$40 to the fund, and the junior class gave \$5.

Starr mailed his application Wednesday night, entering the 100 and 220 dashes. He has set new records in both these events this spring, winning the 220 in 20.9 a few weeks ago, a time that tied the former world's mark, and set a new northwest low. He has run the 100 in 0.8, the best time recorded in the northwest this year. Starr will leave June 9.
