

SOUTHWEST KEEPS UP CONVICT HUNT ON CRIME TRAILS

MIAMI, Okla., June 1.—(AP)—Eleven convicts who broke from the Kansas state penitentiary during a Memorial day mutiny have separated into at least three roving bands, Oklahoma officers directing the search for the outlaws believed today.

Their assumption was based on the latest reports of depredations along tri-state highways attributed to the fugitives who fled to the hill country that has given haven to outlaws since frontier days.

Another Couple Held Up
Three clues on movements of the convicts were received today. Sheriff Dea Waters was advised two hitchhikers, identified as convicts, held up a youth and his girl companion near Seneca, Mo., took their car and sped eastward into Missouri.

Three men escaped after a gun battle with Bob LaFollette at Siloam Springs, Ark. They left their automobile, a car stolen from Leavenworth, Kan., and took a machine belonging to Clint Thompson of Siloam Springs for their getaway.

Armed Posses Go Out
Officers at Ponca City hurriedly loaded machine guns after receiving a tip a band of six, headed by Wilbur Underhill, the "tri-state killer," was heading for the Maggie Grammar ranch 12 miles east of there.

This report said the band was seen 14 miles from Foraker last night. The Grammar ranch is operated by the widow of Henry Grammar, notorious outlaw who was killed in an auto accident ten years ago.

All Osage county roads were patrolled by heavily armed officers who have received repeated reports that the fugitives were playing hide and seek in the border and almost impregnable Osage hills made famous ten years ago by Al Spencer and his gang of southwestern bad men.

Officers believed the six ringleaders who kidnaped Wade Kirk Prather and two guards and released them near Welch Tuesday night, were the ones hiding in the Osage country.

Old Commencement Program Is Found; Records Oddities

A copy of the commencement program for the University of Oregon in 1883 has been found at the home of Ray Bally, 412 Twelfth avenue west. At commencement this year the class of 1883 is to be especially honored as the 50-year one.

The program for 1883 was printed on a small, light green, double folder of heavy paper. On the front was printed, "University of Oregon," "Closing Exercises," "1883," "Guard Job Print."

On the first page inside is printed commencement week program, including baccalaureate sermon by Rev. P. S. Knight of Salem on June 10; graduation exercises, "Address Before University by President Arnold of the State Agricultural college;" reunion of Literary societies, all on Tuesday, June 12; planting of class tree on June 13; meeting of alumni on June 13; graduating exercises and

reunion of alumni on Thursday, June 14.

The second page of the folder gives all the essays, orations, etc., with the following names listed on the program: Misses Mary and Alice Dorris, Miss Alice Parrish, Miss Anna Bushnell, Cutting S. Calef, Miss Sarah Christman, Mrs. George Kincaid, Miss Nettie Denney, Alvin J. Hackett, Oliver P. McFall, Lincoln Taylor, Miss Franc Odell, Hamilton H. Hendricks, Miss Carrie Test. 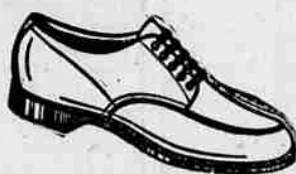
