

MUCH ACTIVITY IS SHOWN IN REPORT BY HEALTH GROUP

Hundreds of persons in Lane county have been examined and treated, numerous clinics held, a large number of maternity cases handled and the health of the people of the county safeguarded in many ways during the past quarter in the way of cooperative health work carried on by the Lane County Health unit. It is shown in the quarterly report just issued at the office of the unit in the courthouse.

In order that the milk supply in Eugene and other communities may be free from contamination and that other foods may remain healthful and wholesome, dairies and places where food is sold have been given frequent inspection and persons handling foods for sale have been given a thorough examination. The report shows that during the quarter there have been 747 dairy inspections, 457 inspections of food-producing places and 59 persons handling foods completely examined.

The report shows that during the quarter 55 persons were tested for tuberculosis and seven of these placed in institutions, while 120 home visits were made in T. B. cases. Children examined for scabies numbered 115. Cows tested for tuberculosis numbered 510 and 372 contagious abortion tests were made among dairy herds.

The number of smallpox immunizations given was 808 and 112 children completed the toxoid treatments for diphtheria immunization. There were 58 maternity delivery cases and 146 pre-natal cases with complete examination and the patient reporting to the office every two weeks.

Included in the figures shown in the report were 312 home visits made to children and 1035 physical examinations at home for medical care to children. Office treatments of school children for communicable diseases or other medical care needed numbered 793 and it was necessary to exclude 307 pupils from rural schools on account of communicable diseases.

There were 123 births in the Eugene district, according to the report; compared with 142 during the same period of 1932 and there were 136 deaths compared with 70 in the same time last year.

from Congressman James W. Mott, who enclosed a statement from the comptroller-general of the United States. The statement was to the effect that the appropriation for the grant land tax fund was about exhausted and that in the opinion of the comptroller-general there was no continuing appropriation. Congressman Mott in his letter suggested that all counties at once file their claims so that pro-rata payments may be made from the amount still on hand for this purpose.

Judge Fisk announced that representatives of all the land grant counties will meet in Eugene Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock when the matter will be discussed and some line of action will be decided upon. The counties besides Lane that have years been receiving this grant land tax money from the Boston, Jackson, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill.

Of Lane county's \$60,000 as expected from the government at the time the 1933 budget was made up \$15,000 was budgeted for indigent relief work and the remaining \$45,000 was to go toward paying interest on county road bonds. If the money is not received the relief work will be greatly affected and the interest payments cannot be met, Judge Fisk pointed out.

Roosevelt Okays 1,556 Job Camps

WASHINGTON, June 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt approved today 237 new forest work projects on which more than 50,000 young men will be employed this summer and fall in 35 states.

Robert Fechner, director of emergency conservation work, said 200 members of the civilian conservation corps would be employed at each of the camps.

Approval of the new projects brought the total of approved forest camps to 1556.

MORGAN PROBE STORY

Firm was reached after it had been decided on a 11 to 3 vote in closed session of the committee to make public the Morgan partnership agreement, save for names of the present partners and the percentages of their interests.

More "Big Names" Out A new list of selected clients was placed before investigators and it included the names of Owen J. Roberts, now associate justice of the supreme court, and W. W. Atterbury, president of the Pennsylvania railroad.

The transaction involved took place before Roberts was appointed to the court.

The latest list, the fourth presented, was of persons sold \$2,000 units of stock in the United Corporation—Morgan utilities stock holding company—in January, 1929, at \$75 each although the price almost at once on the public market was \$99.

This list dealt with clients who purchased through Drexel and company, Morgan affiliate, and included Pennsylvania state supreme Court Justices John W. Kephart and William O. Shaffer.

Governor Gifford Pinchot has demanded their resignation for being on a previous list.

Previous Taxes Listed With J. P. Morgan closely following the testimony, the new list was placed in the record suddenly by Ferdinand Pecora—committee counsel—just after a Morgan witness had given the crowd a thrill by testifying partners in the firm paid total income taxes for 1917 to 1929 inclusive of \$51,358,990.

W. Davis, Morgan counsel. In answer to Senator Glass (D., Va.) Keyes said the 20 partners of the House of Morgan paid, including both state and federal levies, income taxes amounting to \$5,108,701 for 1927; \$8,172,933 for 1928 and \$10,920,879 for 1929.

It had been previously testified they paid none for 1931 and 1932.

to feed one man at Eugene for one day was \$3301 for the month of May. "Building supplies and materials will ordinarily be bought near the prospective camp site and will be bid for on the basis of camp site delivery.

"Pertinent federal laws require that if the established standards of quality are met, the contract to furnish supplies will be awarded to the lowest bidder. In determining the lowest bid, the matter of transportation costs to the place at which the supplies are to be used or accepted is considered. "In the interest of securing low prices and in carrying out the administration's desire to make government purchasing stimulate business in as many communities as possible, it is hoped that all interested dealers will submit bids. All bids should be sent to the District Quartermaster, Eugene, Oregon."

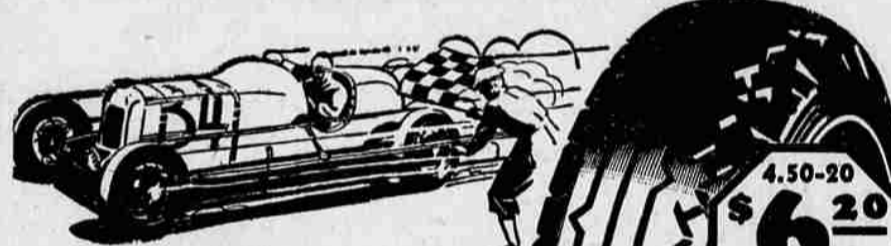
