"Keep Dirigibles," Lindbergh Advises

WASHINGTON, June 1.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh today acts as the defense of lighter-than-air ships as a vital phase in the general development of aviation in testimony before a joint congressional committee investigating the Akron disaster.

Asked his opinion of the cause of the Akron disaster, the Colonel criticized the naval policy of restricting continuation of command. "My personal opinion," he said earnestly, resting both hands on the table, "is that it has been, and is a mistake to discourage specialization in the service."
