Herb Owen, promoter, has invited the Legion and Odd Fellows bands to alternate in playing at the matches. The band members will see the matches as Owen's guests.

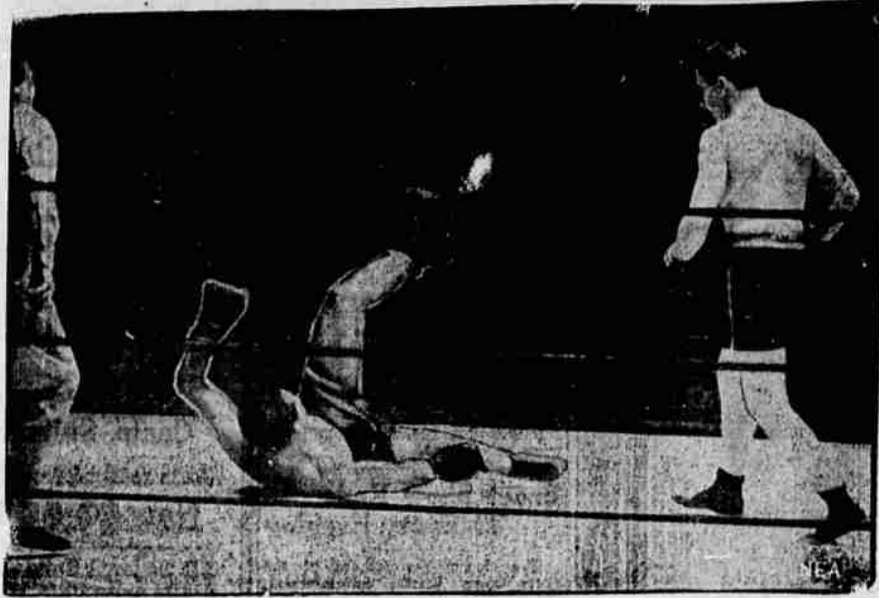
The Eugene high school band, which will be in the parade, has also been invited to attend the matches. The bands will parade from 11th and Olive to the armory.

supply of water. It will be pumped to the 15,000 gallon tank located on the hill about 80 feet above the camp. The pipe trench has been dug and the pump is to be installed this week. A 50-foot fire break has been cleared and burned around the camp and the civilian crew is being instructed in fire prevention.

Electric lights and running water will be provided at the camp. Capt. R. F. Dark of the Seventh Infantry is camp commander and Lt. Kenneth T. Case, Engineers Reserve, is his assistant. Sergeant Wm. Troy and William H. Kettle, private first class, are assigned to the camp.

Clyde S. Martin is camp superintendent for the forestry department, in charge of work. A. V. Ryker and John McGilvery are his road foremen; John McClellan and Roy Goff are trail foremen; Ray Dunning is foreman of fire line construction; Blair Alderman is building construction foreman; C. F. Allen is camp

ground improvement foreman and Charles Stone is telephone foreman. Three tractor drivers, C. A. Ryker, Ansel Lee and Wayne Walker, and one blacksmith, A. H. Bahnsen, have been assigned to the camp by the forestry department.
