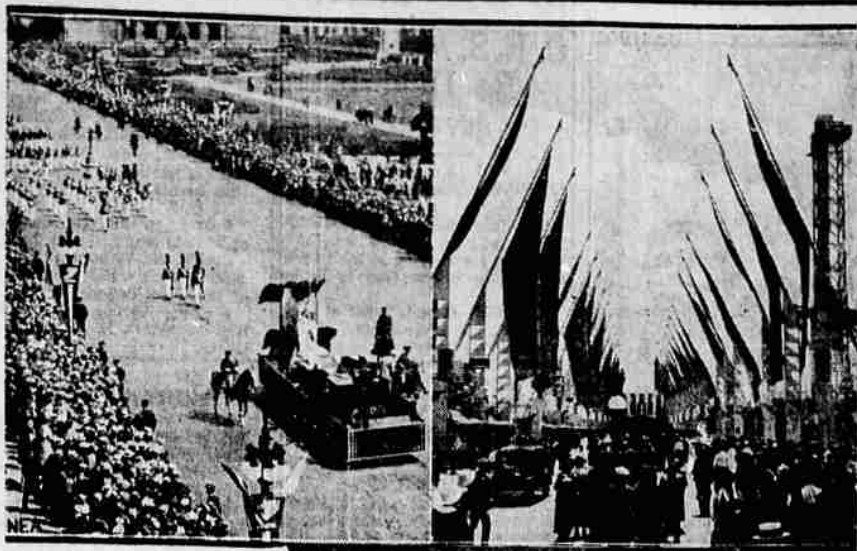


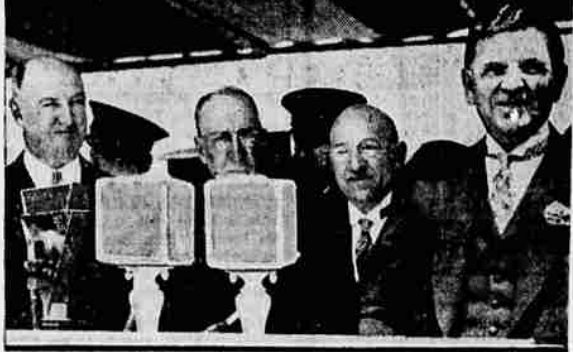

Japanese Delegate Discounts War Rumor

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—Viscount Kikujiro Ishii, who heads the Japanese delegation to the world economic conference, said in an interview today that rumors of possible hostilities between America and Japan are absurd.

"Nothing is more absurd," he said, "than rumors of war between our two nations. It would be ruinous to both. One moment's serious reflection by the intelligent people of either nation shows obviously its impossibility."

With a shrug of his shoulders the Japanese statesman who has been conferring on economic problems with President Roosevelt and who sails for the London conference Friday acknowledged what he interpreted as a belief in some quarters in America that war with Japan is inevitable, was shared by "not a few of my countrymen."

"But in my country, I know, and in your country, I believe," he continued, "that this opinion is not shared among the intelligent people."

"Igloo," the greatest novelty among the season's motion pictures, opens its run at the Heilig theater today. Widespread interest has been created among local theatergoers by this exciting Universal drama of the Arctic, filmed on the desolate snow-swept wastes of Point Barrow, Alaska, with a cast composed entirely of Eskimos. There are thrilling scenes of the natives hunting whale, walrus and polar bear, in an effort to secure the food which the terrible blizzards of the winter have denied them.

Seldom has such an effective melange of thrills, chills, laughs and air of mystery been offered to the entertainment-loving public as is to be found in "The Mystery of the Wax Museum," which opens at the Colonial Thursday. The thrills are heightened by the addition of color photography such as was used in "Doctor X."

In the cast are Lionel Atwill, Fay Wray, Glenda Farrell and Frank McHugh. The picture deals with a strange monster who kidnaps living persons and steals bodies for the most astounding reason imaginable.

Mitchell Income Returns Switched As Agent Moves

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—The government brought out evidence today that after an internal revenue tax agent, who had inspected income tax returns of Charles E. Mitchell, was transferred from the downtown to the uptown office, the Mitchell returns were filed uptown instead of downtown.

Frank W. Black, who always made out the returns for Mitchell, testified at the banker's trial for income tax evasion concerning the inspection of the returns by Agent Ambrose W. Hussey.

By questions the prosecutor brought out that Mitchell's 1927 return gave his office address and was filed downtown but that the next year, when Hussey had been transferred, the home address was used and the return was filed in Hussey's new district.

"Can you tell me why?" the prosecutor asked.

"I think Mr. Mitchell told me to," Black replied.

"Who told you Mr. Hussey had been transferred uptown?" Mr. Mitchell?

"I presume Mr. Hussey himself."

"Did he tell you before you made out Mr. Mitchell's 1928 income tax returns?"

"I don't remember."

Black testified Hussey also examined the 1929 returns, in which the government charges he created a fake loss through a transfer of stock to his wife.
