

WELFARE LEAGUE SPENDS BIG SUM IN MONEY, TIME

Money totaling well over \$1000 and nearly 3000 hours of individual service by members were spent by the Welfare League of Eugene in its program of social service and welfare work during the past year, it was revealed in the annual reports of the organization at the last meeting of the season, Friday morning.

The League has conducted three major projects, cooperation in keeping a city school nurse, a weekly sewing room to assist those who do not have sufficient clothing, and a semi-monthly well baby clinic for those children who do not have regular attention from physicians, in addition to numerous other activities.

aided with eye, ear, nose and throat treatment.

Total of \$60 spent on tonsils and adenoids operations; \$40 given to school children needing these operations; \$20 on clinic children; \$44.05 spent on diaper material for expectant mothers who could not afford to buy them; \$5 on Red Cross office assistant; \$45.20 for Christmas boxes; \$10 on Waverly baby home pledge; \$25 on radio fund to fight Zorn-Macpherson bill; \$120 on city school nurse.

The League conducted a motor car service to baby clinics in Junction City, Springfield, and Creswell until March 1, since then only in and around Eugene and Springfield.

A total of \$154.73 was spent by the League in welfare work in Eugene and vicinity the past year. This sum does not include the sewing room project which was conducted weekly by the League to give out clothes and assist in remodeling them.

The sewing room report does not include the aid given the Red Cross by Welfare League members, who cut approximately 5000 yards of material for the Red Cross. The report, also, does not include the aid given to transients, who number from two to 10 a week, most of them boys under 21 years of age.

The League will not meet during the summer, resuming its monthly gatherings on the first Friday in September. During the summer, however, the well baby clinic will be held semi-monthly at the group's headquarters in the Tiffany building.

The sewing room project was conducted for 13 Thursdays, starting in July. A total of \$115 was spent by the League through the room. Volunteer service hours given by League members totaled 1720. A total of 310 families was aided, the families averaging seven to 10 children each.

of a guard. They were caught last night at Stuart, 20 miles west of the penitentiary, by two marshals who surprised them trying to board a train. They had abandoned the guard's motor car on a mountain road.

The trail of one group of the Kansas sevens led several miles northwest of Siloam Springs, Ark., where three auto thieves shot it out Wednesday night with the police chief, Bob La Follette. A posse started a new search over the steep foot trails in that section after three fishermen late last night had reported seeing three armed men making their way along Flint creek. There are no motor roads in the immediate vicinity.

Countryside Armed Bands of armed citizens and charged officers from a half dozen Oklahoma counties scouted the Chelsea countryside until late last night but returned empty handed, convinced the desperadoes again were secretly secreted in hideouts in the rough hills.

Pursued by a posse, the bank robbers fled in a southwesterly direction from Chelsea, a town of 1500 about 40 miles northeast of Tulsa, then circled west and north and finally were lost while traveling eastward toward the upper corner of the state. Shots were exchanged but apparently none took effect. One pursuing car was disabled and careened into a ditch after it was riddled with robber bullets, but the occupants were uninjured.

gates wants to be placed in the position of having to vote for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment in the event the voters of his county so dictate.

Governors of Colorado and Alabama have vetoed measures designed to create state conventions on the matter on the grounds it is unconstitutional. Hancock said, through the elimination of the deliberative phase of the convention, the body becomes in reality a county referendum, not a state convention, the dry forces claim.
