Minnie Bell Stanard
BROWNSVILLE, June 2.—Minnie Bell Stanard, 55, sister of C. E. Stanard and H. A. Stanard, of Brownsville, died at Salem Monday, May 29, and her funeral and burial were held here Wednesday, May 31. As she was a life-long member of the Brownsville Baptist church, her funeral was held there, Rev. Ralph Wolverton officiating. Interment was at the old Baptist burying ground near the site of the historic Pleasant Butte church north of town.

Miss Stanard was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Stanard, pioneers of 1852, and she was born September 11, 1878, on the Stanard donation land claim north of Brownsville. She attended the Brownsville schools and McMinnville college and was for many years active in church and social welfare work, both in Oregon and in the east. She is survived by four brothers and other relatives. The brothers are W. G. Stanard, Portland; C. E. Stanard and H. A. Stanard, Brownsville; and Rev. Frank Stanard, Independence.

poration of Philadelphia and 1000 Simms Petroleum.

Pecora Is Mum

After the recess was taken, Pecora refused to reply to questions from newspapermen whether the question had any connection with income taxes.

Previous testimony before the committee had disclosed that the 20 Morgan partners paid a total of \$48,000 income tax in 1930.

The committee was taken today behind the scenes of financial drama of the chaotic day of late '29, by a Morgan partner who told how a few bankers—with \$250,000,000 at their fingers—supported the crashing market. It was a profitable operation, too.

George Whitney, the Morgan partner, testified that although loss had been expected, the 1,148,609 shares purchased were sold at \$1,067.355 profit, exclusive of interest.

Procedure Is Long

The massive purchases lasted some three weeks. "It ended, as I recall, on November 11," Whitney said.

Leading up to his story in answers to Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, the witness related how his

brother Richard, then vice president and now president of the New York Stock Exchange, had "come to see us first" about doing something to halt price slides on the exchange.

"How much did you buy?" Senator Couzens (R., Mich.), asked.

"We bought 1,148,600 shares," Whitney replied, at a cost of \$137,752,706.

"We sold out in 1930 for \$138,820,000."

"How was the profit divided?" divided?" Couzens asked.

"Among us according to participation," Whitney said. "We expected to take a loss and at one time our book loss was \$40,000,000."

Gushy of "Pool"
The witness objected to Pecora's use of the word "pool" to describe the transaction.

"We are rather gushy of the word, as used colloquially," he smiled. J. P. Morgan asked as Whitney testified he directed Morgan & Company's participation in the pool under supervision of Thomas W. Lamont, another Morgan partner.
