

Strawberries Advanced; Stock Prices In Decline

SUPPLIES SCARCE DURING WEEK-END ON EUGENE MART

An extreme shortage on strawberries faced the local markets at the week-end and prices jumped up again. No berries were to be found Friday afternoon and very few came in Saturday morning. The crop is running very below normal and the bad weather has not allowed what crop there is to ripen.

Prices were up to \$2.50 a crate, buying price, Saturday. The berries were retailing at two boxes for 25 cents. Practically all shipments from California have stopped here and the local crop is far from sufficient to carry the trade here. If the rain continues what crop there is will be rotted. Eugeneans anticipating the local strawberry season are expressing their disappointment, especially after the bumper crop of last year.

No other changes were reported for any of the markets Saturday. All produce, including eggs, poultry, butter, and buttermilk, remained steady. Livestock and grains were likewise unchanged.

A report from the Eugene Fruit Growers association says that the prune crop in the Eugene section is expected to run about 75 per cent of a full crop, a larger output than for last year. The farther south one goes, the better the prune prospects. Up at Vancouver and Portland areas, the crop is running 20 per cent or less. Yamhill, Dallas, and Salem districts all report very poor crops. Cherries are looked to be a bumper crop. Pears are running normal.

CHICAGO, June 3.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Wheat prices broke almost 2 cents a bushel on the board of trade today under persistent liquidation and selling induced by weaker outside markets.	
Professionals and larger commission houses sold as favorable crop reports came in from the northwest spring wheat territory, while some pressure was induced by Washington reports that officials were uneasy about the recent rapid rise in prices.	
Holidays abroad indicated a falling off in export business for the next few days. The corn market reacted with wheat on good weather in the corn belt, but pressure was less severe and declines were confined to a fractional range.	
At the close wheat was 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cent lower, corn was off 5-8 to 3-4 cent and oats were 1-8 to 3-8 cent lower.

FINANCIAL MARKETS STUMBLE; TRADING VOLUME IS HEAVY

NEW YORK, June 3.—(AP)—Financial markets stumbled over profit taking but today some price declines were general in both stocks and staples. Late rallying efforts in leading shares retrieved some of the earlier losses, but the close was rather large. Trading volume was unusually large, transactions approximating 3,500,000 shares.

The stock market started off at a fast pace. Blocks of 1,000 to 12,000 shares changing hands. Losses of 1 to 3 or more points were suffered by leading issues following their climb yesterday to the highest levels since 1931. Rails and utilities resisted for a while, but they too, slid off.

Foreign exchanges were comparatively steady.

Stocks apparently ignored the report on freight carloadings for the week ended May 27, which showed an advance of 9,000 over the previous week to a total of 541,300, or 20,000 ahead of the similar week in 1932. The increase, however, was about in line with previous estimates.
