BEATS LINDY'S MARK!

NEW YORK, June 5.—(AP)—By a matter of just a few miles it appeared today that James Matern, solo globe-girdling flier, unofficially had bettered Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's six year old solo distance record of 3,440 miles from New York to Paris.

Estimates were that the Texas aviator covered about 3,670 miles in his flight from New York to Paris—30 miles more than the Lone Eagle hopped non-stop across the Atlantic in 1927.

The Matern flight also lopped two hours off the Lindbergh flying time—a difference which aviation followers said was not due so much to Matern's skill as to the 500-horse power motor in his monoplane, Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis" was powered by a 200 horse power motor.

over the Baltic, where he was obliged to fly blind. He entered the Soviet Union at the Soviet-Esthanian frontier.

While Matern ambitiously hoped to push on to Novosibirsk, 1700 miles eastward in Siberia, Soviet officials suggested it would be better to stop at Omsk, 400 miles short of Novosibirsk. They were almost certain to insist that he follow the southern route along the Trans-Siberian railway, through Omsk, Novosibirsk, Irkutsk, (on Lake Baikal) and Khabarovsk, near the Pacific coast.

Passage Is Very Tough

Describing his trans-Atlantic flight, Matern said:

"It sure was a tough passage over the ocean. Last year's flight was like going to California by comparison."

Matern said he had first intended to aim for Paris. He found the first 400 miles smooth and then it suddenly "iced up." He tried unsuccessfully to escape the freezing sheet which covered his wings by flying at different levels. He finally decided to change his course northward, "but I only found more ice."

NORWAY REPORTS

OSLO, Norway, June 5.—(AP)—Jimmie Matern, the grinning Texas aviator the world has feared lost, who reached Moscow early today in his red-white-and-blue plane "Century of Progress" today made a surprise landing on a small island 70 miles south-west of Oslo.

Fighting storms and fogs, which forced him 300 kilometers off his course, the dauntless flier from San Angelo, Tex., fought his way through successfully to land safely on Jomfruland island, on Norway's south coast, at 4:15 a. m., eastern standard time, yesterday.

The first news that Oslo heard of the landing came when the lighthouse keeper telephoned from his post on the island that Matern had landed on the beach there and was safe.

A private plane was sent there to give him any aid necessary and at 9 p. m., eastern standard time, yesterday, he hopped for Oslo. Landing at the military aerodrome, he halted only briefly, and with his big tanks brimful with more than 700 gallons of gasoline, he was off toward the Russian metropolises at 12:40 a. m., today, eastern standard time.

First Man to Do It

He is the first man to make a non-stop hop alone from New York to Norway.

Matern, who appeared very tired, said he had had nothing but oranges to eat and only a little water to drink during the long flight from New York to Newfoundland and thence across the Atlantic.

He met fogs and storm on the way over and was 300 kilometers off his route when he reached Norway.

"When I reached the west coast of Norway, I thought it was Scotland," said Matern.

there under constant guard by deputies from the sheriff's office.

Banks will be in the hospital for at least two weeks more, it is said. Mrs. Banks was not here Monday morning when the operation was performed. She has been in Medford. The operation was authorized by relatives who will stand the expense.

The attorneys for Banks have not filed as yet for a new trial, having been granted 20 days from May 22 to do so. Under the verdict handed out by the Lane county jury, the ex-Medford publisher and orchardist would have to be sentenced to life imprisonment.

Investigation of alleged perjury in the Banks trial, held here recently, was asked in a letter received Monday by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle from Governor Julius L. Meier.

The attorney general said he would probably appoint Ralph E. Moody, Medford attorney, to investigate and make any prosecutions regarding alleged perjury of witnesses at the trial.

Mr. Moody was in charge of the prosecution at the trial of Banks. At present he is in charge of prosecution of alleged ballot thefts in Jackson county.

The four banks in Lane county and the First National bank of Portland Monday filed application with the county court to be declared depositors of Lane county funds for the coming year, and the usual two percent interest on daily balances will be paid, but after June 9 the interest will cease, the banks announced.

Under a new law passed by the last state legislature interest on daily balances of county or other public funds is not compulsory. It simply provides that the governing body and the banks may make arrangements for interest, but the banks have decided they will pay none.

The county budget committee in December budgeted \$5000 as esti-

ated income from this source, but they will lose perhaps half this sum as a result of the decision of the banks to cut off the interest on daily balances.

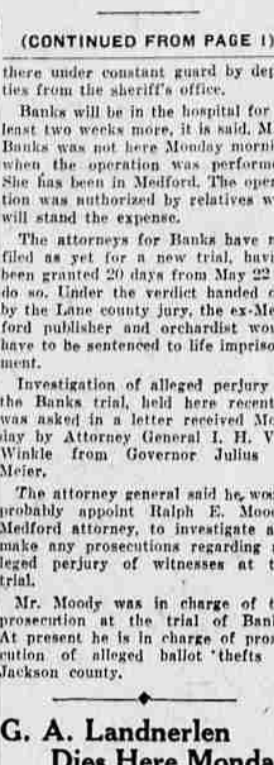
