

REGULAR CHURCH ATTENDANCE SAID NEED OF PRESENT

The concluding program in the series of Bible recitals given the past two weeks by Dr. H. H. Halley of Chicago was held Sunday evening at the Methodist Episcopal church, an unusually large crowd turning out for the event. The series has been conducted as a union event by the Eugene Ministerial association. Dr. Halley has given all books of the Bible from memory. Sunday evening he gave an address, "The Habit of Going to Church Every Sunday Morning as an Act of Worship to God," was the general theme for Dr. Halley's talk. Excerpts from it follow:

"All Christian people ought to go to church every Sunday morning, unless hindered by sickness, or necessary work, or necessity of some kind. It ought to be a matter of conscience, and an act of worship."

"The churches are the most important institutions in any community. The Sunday morning service is the church's principal way of doing its work; it is THE EVENT of the community life. Nothing ever happens in any community as important to the life of the community as the regular Sunday morning church services."

"Every community ought to love its churches, and, at this appointed time turn out, en masse, to honor Him in whose name the church exists."

"If the churches were filled every Sunday morning, the community would take notice, evangelistic work of the church would be done, financial problems would be solved, missionary problems would be solved. The whole church program would be advanced. It is the one thing that would make the churches strong; the one thing on which depends the solution of the problems facing Protestantism."

"If all Protestant church people would stir themselves up to the faithful in this one fundamental Christian duty, it would set forward the influence of the church, and the Christ for whom the church stands, more than all the rest of the things the churches are doing put together."

"It is the motive that prompts it, the thing in your mind before you go that makes you start. Doing it as a matter of common Christian principles, as a matter of conscience toward God, for Christ, not caring especially who is to preach, or sing, or what you may wear or who you may see; going, if need be, in spite of what you expect to hear, finding your chief satisfaction in the thought that you are doing your duty to your God. And, of course, it implies that you will try to be there on time; and that you will be quiet, reverent, attentive, and sympathetic."

"Sunday morning, by common consent, is church time, Christ's time. In the early days of Christianity, in times of persecution, and before Sunday was made a civil rest day, Christians met before day or after dark, or whenever they could. But now, by common usage, Sunday morning is universally recognized as church time. The world has dedicated this hour to the church for the regular and orderly promotion of Christ's work."

"It is one of the DUTIES we owe our Saviour to be loyal to the institution which He Himself founded and on which depends the final issue of His work. One of the most mischievous ideas abroad among Protestant people is that they can be good Christians without going to church. It is not enough to be fairly regular. The great body of good church people who are just fairly regular are the ones that hold the key to the present pitiful situation. If they would become altogether regular our churches would be filled every Sunday. This would mean new life to the church, with the opportunity to accomplish everything the church leadership might desire. The grand need of Protestantism is that our people make this thing a matter of conscience rather than of convenience."

God as Cause and Creator is Topic

"God the Only Cause and Creator" was the subject of the lesson-sermon in all Churches of Christ Scientists, on Sunday, June 4.

The Golden Text was, "Great and marvellous are thy works, Lord God Almighty; just and true are thy ways, thou King of Saints" (Rev. 15:3).

Among the citations which comprised the lesson-sermon was the following from the Bible: "Have we not all one father? hath not one God created us?" (Mal. 2:10).

The lesson-sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Divine Mind is the only cause or principle of existence. Cause does not exist in matter, in mortal mind, or in physical forms. Mortals are egotists. They believe themselves to be independent workers, personal authors, and even privileged originators of something which Deity would not or could not create. . . . A belief in other gods, other creators, and other creations must go down before Christian Science." (pp. 292, 335).

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—G. B. McLeod, president of the Western Forestry and conservation Association, announced here today a reorganization of committees of the association designed to bring about, he said, closer relationship under the stress of enforced curtailment due to economic conditions and to insure uniform representation of the various agencies of five western timber states.

Cronmiller, Oregon state forester; T. T. Munger, in charge of experiments; J. D. Coffman, national parks, and W. B. Greeley, Seattle, appointed as a representative at large.

Cornell Scholarship Given Law Student

John H. King, Freshwater, senior student in economics and law, has been awarded a scholarship in the Cornell university law school, valued at \$400, according to word received here. King and 16 others won scholarships from a field of 125 applications.

The Cornell law school, regarded as one of the best in the country, is on a strictly graduate basis. It is housed in the Myron Taylor hall, a \$1,500,000 building presented by Mr. Taylor, chairman of the board of the U. S. Steel corporation. King will leave here in the fall for Cornell to continue his law studies.

LUTHERAN CHURCH HAS CONFIRMATION

Confirmation services were held at Grace Lutheran church Sunday, 12 being received into membership of the church. Five were baptized.

Rev. Martin P. Simon, pastor, preached the confirmation sermon. His sermon in part follows: "Paul, writing to the Galatians, says: 'I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live. Yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life, which I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God who loved me, and gave himself for me.' (2:20). 'Paul had at first bitterly fought the crucified Christ. But there came a day when he called him Lord whom he had hated. That changed the course of history. From then on he determined not to know anything save Jesus Christ and him crucified.'"

"He does not merely say: Christ was crucified, but I am crucified with Christ. Christ's crucifixion counts as mine. Jesus lived and died; he lived and died for me. He loved me, and gave himself for me. He is my substitute."

"That is the Christian faith. To that we pledge ourselves. 'Those words show also that a Christian life will follow on a 'Christian faith.' 'Christ liveth in me' is a brief statement of it. Unfortunately there are professing Christians who by their acts prove that Christ is dead in them. But there is no sincere Christian who is not a much better man for being a Christian."

"Christians endeavor to live a good life, but not because they think to earn heaven thereby. The driving power is the love of God. The power of that love is greater than any other force on earth. The Christian feels: 'The life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me.' To that life we pledge ourselves."

"May God give us grace to show our Christian faith in a Christian life."

50,000 EASTERN MEN ORDERED TO FAR WEST CAMPS

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(AP)—More than 50,000 young easterners and mid-westerners today were ordered to forest work projects in the Rockies and Pacific coast ranges.

The orders were issued by the war department after conferences with Robert Fechner, director of conservation work. They cut almost in half the number originally intended for the western assignment.

"A final check up of the camp locations approved by President Roosevelt," Fechner said, "disclosed that it would be necessary to send 33,574 men to western states because of a shortage of approved forest work projects in other sections of the country."

Fechner said his present program will put 274,000 men in forest work camps by July 1, and 300,000 by July 6.

Fechner said the movement of 53,000 men from eastern, central and southern conditioning camps to the west already was under way and should be completed in three weeks. Those going into the far west ninth corps area include:

25,400 from New York, New Jersey and Delaware.
10,350 from Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia.
6,850 from Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois and Eastern Missouri.
3,800 from Iowa, Western Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota and Arkansas.

HOME ECONOMICS PROGRAM IN LANE COUNTY PLANNED

A thrift and educational program in home economics extension for 1933-34, as prepared by the county executive committee in home extension work, is being started this week according to Gertrude L. Skow, home demonstration agent at meetings at Pleasant Hill and Elmira. The program was developed from recommendations made by the 110 homemakers who attended the county homemakers' day May 11. Members of the committee are: Mrs. Clyde Wright, newly elected chairman; Mrs. Irene Gussling, Pleasant Hill, vice-chairman; Mrs. J. W. Maxwell, Irvine, secretary; Mrs. H. H. Gunther, Eugene, treasurer; Mrs. H. A. Sims, Santa Clara; Mrs. Frank Harlow, Willamette, and Mrs. Arthur Baugh, Mohawk. Retiring members present were Mrs. Ralph Laird, Jasper, and Mrs. J. A. Adkins, Alvadore. Miss Charibel Nye, state leader of home economics extension, worked with the committee.

The adoptions on the program for the coming year are as follows: I.—Organization and Administration: County Homemakers' day, May 10, 1934. Training meetings of officers of groups, last week in September, in western Lane, Eugene and Cottage Grove.

II.—Foods and Nutrition: 1.—Home food conservation and preservation, with local leaders trained for demonstrating home drying and salting will be given during July. The home demonstration agent was asked to act in an advisory capacity and to give technical information and supervision of food conservation for food relief; this is already under way in the eggs, milk and cheese projects, and with the food preservation bulletins now available and being distributed.

2.—Low cost meals project will be given in the fall, in 13 centers in the county.

3.—Assistance in canning for the hot lunches in schools will be given during the summer to groups desiring to do this type of community help.

III.—Clothing and Textiles: Renovating and textile study will be continued for groups not having received it this past year. Economical dress designing and making will be demonstrated during the winter and early spring, including assistance

for wise purchasing of textile, care of clothing, etc.

IV.—Parent Education and Child Development: Radio study clubs for groups will be organized in the fall and winter with training for leaders being made available. The principal topics in these clubs will deal with understanding the older child, and also the parent. Rallies for members of these clubs will be held in local points during each season; the months suggested for these rallies are November, and February. This project will be made available to all interested clubs in Lane county.

The annual school for parents is again included, and will be held during March in Eugene. Schools for parents may be extended to western and southern Lane county this fall and winter, since travel is difficult for homemakers desiring the material included in these schools.

V.—Recreation and Dramatics: Monthly training meetings for leaders in community singing, recreation, and dramatics will be continued. An institute for special training will be held in October, which will start the series of training meetings.

The second county homemakers' vacation camp will be held the first week in August at Camp Clewax.
