Berry Crop Short One For Cannery

The cannery expects to be at work on the berries in about 10 days. Field men are out now looking over the situation, but it is certain that the cannery will have a very short run on the berries.

At present the plant is at work on gooseberries, having just finished with the first cutting of rhubarb.

Mildew Seen in Nearby Hop Yards

The downy mildew disease is showing in practically every hop yard of this section, due to the damp cool weather this spring, it is reported.

The disease has not spread to an extent to cause any great alarm, however, although a check has not been made within the past few days, according to the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent. Growers have been spraying to control the mildew.

Reports from Salem say the disease is spreading in many of the larger hop yards.

There is still time to plant Hungarian millet for hay and forage, O. S. Fletcher, county agent, declared Tuesday, answering many inquiries being received at his office regarding this crop.

Sudan grass also may be planted for temporary pasture and hay crops. The recent rain was of great benefit to those farmers planting alfalfa now and the heavy planting of this crop in Lane county is continuing, Fletcher said. Farmers are warned that a firm seed bed is necessary to insure success with alfalfa. Also the seed should be inoculated to give it power to extract nitrogen from the air.

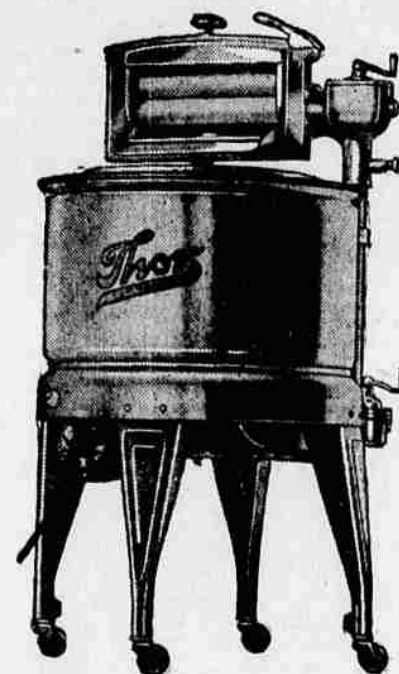
