BREAKS HOLLYWOOD HOPE TO REPLACE DUCKS AS LEADERS

Just how Manager George Burns has made a winning club of his Seattle Indians no one seems to know, but that he has is evident from the results.

Deep in the league's lower regions three weeks ago, the Indians took a new lease on life and since then have played better than 500 baseball. Showing across five runs in the eighth inning yesterday, the Burns' men beat the second-place Hollywood Stars 7-6 for their 12th victory in 21 starts.

The scrappy Seattle manager had a part in that winning rally, working a double squeeze along with Homer Summa to score on Cossette's bunt. Singles by Frank Cox, Mel Almada and Chick Ellsworth brought in the final three Indian tallies. Burns contributed four singles to the Seattle attack. Herman Pillette went the route for the winners.

Los Angeles jumped on Herb Saunders, Sacramento rookie, in the tenth inning at the Sacramento capital to capture the series opener 8-4. Relieving Tom Flynn at the beginning of the eighth, Saunders held the Angels scoreless for two innings and then wilted to let in four runs in the extra inning. Buck Newsom struck out 9 Senators in the 9-2-3 innings he pitched and received credit for the victory. Dorr Camilli homered for the Solons.

Jimmy Zinn, San Francisco veteran, welcomed the Oaks home to Emeryville with 5-hit hurling that cost them the series opener with the Seals, 3-1. Roy Joiner hurled evenly for Oakland and was responsible for only one of the three San Francisco scores. Harlan Pool's four-bagger in the ninth opened a shutout for Zinn. Last night's Portland-Milsons game in San Francisco was postponed until Saturday when the lights went off.

POPULAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Taking two straight falls, one of them on a foul, Wong Bock Cheung, Chicago Chinese, won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Abe Kaplan of New York. Cheung weighed 214 pounds and Kaplan, 219.

The Chinese was given the first fall in 25 minutes when Kaplan dropped him with an upercut to the jaw and the referee called it a foul. Cheung took the second and deciding fall in 10 minutes with a Manchurian choke hold.

Richard Stahl, 218, Berlin, won the five-round semi-windup from Nore Jerstrom, 215, Chicago, getting one fall. Larry Bennett, 171, Portland, and Heine Olson, 172, Portland, went three rounds to a draw in the preliminary.

70,000 TO SEE TWO MAXES MEET THURSDAY NIGHT

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—Carpenters rushed work today on the ring and ringside seats at Yankee stadium, and down at Times Square ticket salesman played cash register symphonies.

Tomorrow Jack Dempsey will put on his first big boxing show, throwing the two Maxes, Schmeling and Baer, into the ring before what he hopes will be a crowd of 70,000.

Bronzed by a Jersey sun and hardened after weeks of active training, Baer came to New York today to help complete the Dempsey ballyhoo. He went to the home of a friend.

Schmeling also came to town today and will be quartered at the Commodore hotel until time for the weighing-in and exchange of pleasantries at 2 p. m. tomorrow.

Schmeling continued a firm favorite at odds of 2 to 1. Expert opinion so definitely favored the German Max as to indicate a lengthening of the odds before fight time. It was all but impossible to find a boxing writer who believed Baer would win unless the Californian managed to find a haymaker in an early round. Most opinion admitted the possibility of an early knockout victory for Baer, but leaned toward a key win for Schmeling before the tenth round, and a certain victory for the German if the fight goes the 15-round limit.

Dempsey, incidentally, freely predicts a knockout, both on and off the record, but he won't predict the winner.

Both of the principals went through routine light workout yesterday. The relative rest was welcome to Baer, who was finely drawn—too fine, some of the experts felt. Baer was a slight, fatish, 230 plus, when he came east for the fight, and the work which has brought him down to 210 may have been too strenuous. Schmeling will weigh between 185 and 190 pounds, an ideal weight for him.

While no championship is involved, the magic name of Dempsey, the elaborate ballyhoo, and the fact that Schmeling was but recently a champion, have made tomorrow's contest a major attraction.

Those teams represented and ready to play were as follows: Woodmen of the World, South Siders, Moose, McMorran and Washburne, Farmers' Creamery, Active Club, Junior Chamber of Commerce. Besides these teams the K. of C. have expressed themselves as being greatly interested.

RULES ON LEAGUE OUTLINED TUESDAY

Rules to govern the play of the Y. M. C. A. Junior chamber of commerce playground baseball league were formulated at a meeting held at the "X" Tuesday night. There will be no eligibility rules and players will not be restricted to any position.

Each team must furnish an umpire for each of their games which will be for seven innings. Games called on account of darkness or inclement weather must have completed the fifth inning to count.

The official outdoor-hardball will be used with overhand pitching allowed. The official rules of this game will be followed with the following exceptions:

1—No running on the last strike.

2—No bases on a hit batter. Dead ball.

3—Infield and outfield flies must be caught to be counted out.

The distance between bases will be 60 feet with the distance between the pitcher's box and home plate set at 45 feet. Spike shoes will be barred and all games will start at 6:30 o'clock.

The closing date for registrations will be Tuesday evening, June 13, at 7:30 at which time a meeting will be held to appoint a committee to draw up the schedule. This meeting will be held in Dick Strite's office at the city Y. M. C. A.

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BROOKLYN DODGERS IN SEVENTH PLACE

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers dropped to seventh place in the national standings yesterday when beaten, 7 to 2, by the league-leading New York Giants, permitting the idle Boston Braves to advance to sixth position. It was New York's third straight win over the flounders.

St. Louis strengthened its grip on second place by beating Cincinnati, 6 to 2, in a game marked by fistfights between Dizzy Dean of the Cards and Paul Derringer of the Reds before the contest opened. The Cincinnati pitcher accused Dean of "fiddling" him in previous games. Acting Manager Jewel Eas of the Reds was ordered from the field for objecting too vigorously to an umpire's decision, and Umpires Barr and Pflanz were escorted from the field by police at the end of the game.

A four-run rally in the eighth enabled Chicago to repulse Pittsburgh, 5 to 3.

Philadelphia at Boston was played on a previous date.

The New York Yankees extended their American league lead to six full games by taking both ends of a double-header from Boston, 4 to 0, and 8 to 4.

Philadelphia replaced Cleveland in fourth position by walloping Washington, 8 to 4, while the Indians bowed to Detroit, 5 to 2, when "Schoolboy" Rowe held Cleveland to seven hits. Chicago downed St. Louis, 5 to 3.
