

**WATER SUPPLY UP; EGGS WEAK**

WATERLAND, Ore., June 7.—(Special)—The water supply of butter is increasing in the local trade. The price in general there was practically no change in current values for butter as the open market remains steady. The price for eggs continues to reflect the same here. Only one distributor is quoted in a nominal price. Others are openly quoting 1 to 2 cents below.

There are off on lightweight hens in all places with broilers generally showing more than a passing interest as a result of the increase in price for home grown eggs during the day. Wholesale prices for Gold Dollars around \$2.50, California around \$2.50, and others were around \$2.15 for 100.
