

LANE TRUCKMEN JOIN FIGHT ON NEW REGULATION

Joining a state-wide move to stop operation of the recently enacted state truck and bus law which goes into effect July 1, the Lane County Truck Owners and Farmers Protective association was formed at a meeting at the chamber of commerce here Tuesday night.

Lumbermen, independent truck owners, farmers and others interested in trucking gathered at the chamber to form the local unit of a state group seeking to bring a court injunction against the law to prevent its going into operation.

The law, said by those at the meeting to strike at the livelihood of hundreds of Lane county citizens, was passed at the last state legislative session, and according to information obtained through long investigation, will put virtually all small truck operators out of business.

Officers of the association elected Tuesday night were Ralph Gray, president; Earl G. Muhr, secretary.

A special committee named to carry on the fight here is composed of E. A. Lewis, chairman; E. H. Lorenzen, treasurer; W. M. Lyons, C. D. McKay, W. F. Gibson, E. R. Morris, J. H. Brown.

The movement was started in Portland ten days before the association was formed in that city, Salem and Eugene. When the state is completely organized, it is planned to seek a court injunction to stop the operation of the law, it was said.

The law will be attacked on the grounds of being discriminatory against small truck owners and favoring larger truck operators.

Provisions of the new law, which few persons have understood, call for truck owners to purchase good faith bonds of \$1,000 before they can buy a license. In order to get this bond, it was explained, they must show collateral equaling \$300 besides their truck. As in most cases small truck operators have no property except their truck, this means they must post \$300 cash in order to be allowed to buy a license.

"This one phase of the law alone would eliminate virtually every small truck operator in the state," speakers at the meeting declared. "Here in Lane county there are hundreds of men, out of work, who have gone into the hills to cut wood. They plan to haul it to town with their trucks to sell to earn a living for themselves and families."

"Not one of these men would be able to deposit \$300 cash to buy a license for his truck, his year's work would be gone and he would be unable to get his wood to town and as a result would have to go on the county."

Another provision of the law requires, besides the regular license fee, additional sums for loads hauled over a certain limit. This requires complex bookkeeping systems on the part of every truck operator, from the farmer who hauls some hogs to market to the man operating a regular truck line. Weekly and monthly reports, in duplicate, must be filed with the state, necessitating difficult double-entry bookkeeping systems.

This phase, also, would be so expensive and difficult that it would cut out the smaller truck operators, it was pointed out.

The operation of the law itself is so complex that an expert accountant, who has been working on the thing in Salem for three months, was unable to explain it clearly at the meeting Tuesday night, leaders of the association declared. After three months work, he was unable to tell how much truck owners would have to pay to get a license. No truck owner can find out how much it will cost him to operate this year after the new law goes into effect.

E. B. Gabriel, of Salem, who has studied the law extensively, declared at the meeting the operation of the law would "put 10,000 trucks off the highways of the state and throw 50,000 persons on the public for support" the instant it was put into operation.

Definite plans for the injunction against the law have not yet been made, it was said. Upon completion of the work of organizing the state, plans will be formulated and a united effort made to stop the operation of the law.

SWIMMING COURSE

TO START JUNE 12

The annual Red Cross swimming and life saving classes will start June 12 this year with Hal Hutton in charge of instruction and classes are being held at the men's and women's pools at the university for the first week. It was announced Wednesday by Frank Riggs, permanent chairman of the Red Cross committee in charge of the events.

Children 16 and under and adults over 16 may register for the classes at the Register-Guard office. A registration fee of \$1 per week to cover pool, towel and suit expenses, is being charged this year.

Classes will be divided according to swimmers, those who are able to swim 20 feet with difficulty, and non-swimmers, and those seeking life-saving work.

Following the first week at the university pools, classes will be conducted for a week at the Anchorage under the same plan.
