TEX KNIGHT WILL MEET JENSEN IN 45-MINUTE EVENT

Harold Hiebert, St. Helens logger, will meet Otis Clingman, Oklahoma City, in the main event on tonight's wrestling program at the Eugene armory. Hiebert is holder of the Pacific coast middleweight championship while Clingman is ex-middleweight champion of the U. S. navy.

Hiebert is probably the most improved grappler in the business. He



started in Eugene as a preliminary bout a few years ago and advanced into the main event class. His rough and at times unorthodox tactics have not made him the most popular grappler in the business but his consistently good showings have made him one of the most respected.

Clingman, on the other hand, is one of the cleanest boys in the game. Perhaps this is due in part to Clingman's ability to administer punishment in a nice way. He can be much harder on an opponent in a clean way than can most of the rough boys by using "dirty" tactics.

The Clingman-Hiebert match is a "natural" from the fan's point of view for a meeting between these two boys promises few dull moments. Hiebert has been training diligently for the battle because he believes a victory over Clingman will give him the ranking number 1 position in this district. He has already beaten Thor Jensen, the Elkhart thunderbolt.

Jensen is to appear in the special event against Tex Knight, local grappler. Knight has been suffering from a neck injury and in the event he is unable to go on, Owen will have two boys on hand—Adams, the Portland milkman, and Gorilla Pogi, of Argentina. One of these boys will meet Jensen if Knight fails to show.

GERMAN FAVORED OVER BUTCHER BOY IN BETTING ODDS

NEW YORK, June 8.—(U.P.)—The age-old lust for combat and the magic name of Jack Dempsey will draw some 70,000 persons into Yankee stadium tonight to watch Max Schmeling and Max Baer battle for 15 rounds or less.

Dempsy, promoting his first big-time show, has been likened to the late Tex Rickard of million-dollar fame. A traditional Rickard break in the weather would establish the old Manassa Mauler as the ace promoter of the present day, for a fair afternoon and early evening virtually would assure a sell-out of the 50,000 seats.

Such a sale would allow Dempsy, Schmeling, Baer and the cancer hospital to split a fortune of nearly \$400,000. Advance sales were estimated today to have approached the \$175,000 mark, but this was only a guess.

"I know I've got better than \$125,000," Dempsy said, "but there are many agencies who haven't reported back. All I really know is that boys in my Broadway office are selling tickets as fast as they can make change and they're pretty good at that."

Maxes in Town
Schmeling, who won the championship "sitting down" on a foul blow from Jack Sharkey, and who lost to the same man two years later, motivated to town today from his Lake Swannanoa, N. J., country club retreat. He remained a firm 2 to 1 betting favorite, and the odds in his favor were expected to lengthen to 3 to 1 by fight time. Betting was light.

Baer preceded Schmeling by one day. He meted yesterday from his camp at the Bader aviation field in Atlantic City, to the home of an anonymous friend. Schmeling made temporary quarters at the Commodore hotel.

The principals were to weigh in at the boxing commission office at 2 p. m. Baer and a sarcastic speech ready for Schmeling but few believed he would remember to deliver it. The fight itself promises to be in-fighting, on the part of Schmeling against Baer's long-range slugging.

Baer, who will weigh better than 210 pounds to Schmeling's 190, is a slugger who doesn't mind leaving himself wide open while swinging from his shoelaces.

In addition to outweighing Schmeling by some 20 pounds Baer has the longer reach and the more rugged physique. But Schmeling is nearly as strong, is vastly more intelligent, and can box better than Baer four ways from the deuce.

Not more than one in ten of the domestic and imported boxing writers gives Baer as much as a 50-50 chance. Dempsy predicted a knockout but would not name the man.

Dempsy reiterated today his original announcement that there would be no broadcast.

CUBS SHOW RARE PLAYING ABILITY TO BEAT PIRATES

If it were not for the fact that a couple of other clubs, which had head starts, have been playing almost unbeatable baseball, the Chicago Cubs might be earning themselves a "miracle team" designation for their brilliant work during the past couple of weeks.

The Cubs floundered badly during the early part of the season, apparently feeling keenly the absence of Kiki Cuyler. On May 20, they were in seventh place. Then they started winning games.

They have rolled up a record of 14 victories in 19 starts, have climbed to fourth place, where they are pressing the Pittsburgh Pirates hard, and they might be higher except for the brilliant play of the St. Louis Cardinals and New York Giants, now virtually tied for the lead.

The Cubs smashed the Pirates down into defeat for the third successive time yesterday, winning 7-2 on a thunderous 12 hit attack against Bill Swift and Remy Kremer. They scored all their runs in two big innings to offset Guy Bush's wildness and reduced Pittsburgh's margin to a half game.

Braves Beat Phils

The Boston Braves tightened their hold on sixth place by defeating the last-place Phillies 3-1 in the only other National league game scheduled as Ben Cantwell pitched shutout ball up to the last inning, giving only six hits.

The Philadelphia Athletics and Washington Senators again furnished the high spot in the American league when they struggled to a 13-13 tie in nine innings. A windstorm and darkness halted the game in the tenth after Washington had scored another run. The Senators piled up ten runs in the first two frames only to lose their lead when the A's staged a five run uprising in the eighth with Jimmie Fox's eighth homer of the season coming with two on base, as the climax.

The net result was to give the Chicago White Sox second place in the standing. The Sox downed the St. Louis Browns for the fifth consecutive time, 4-1 in a tight duel between Gasman and Bump Hadley. The Detroit Tigers cut loose in the sixth inning, when Marvin Owen cleared a four bagger to start the rally, and scored enough runs to beat Cleveland 3-1 as Tommy Bridges limited the Indians to six hits.

The New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox had an off day, due to preparations for tonight's heavyweight fight at the Yankee stadium.

The fact the United States government crop report would be issued tomorrow and that the world economic conference was scheduled to meet in London Monday tended to restrict operations. Sensational advances in British exchange failed to act as much of a stimulus.
