

COAST ATHLETIC HEADS GATHER FOR SPOKANE MEETING

SPOKANE, Wash., June 8.—(AP)—Determined to solve some of the problems besetting intercollegiate athletics of the west, faculty representatives, graduate managers and coaches of Pacific coast conference colleges moved on Spokane today for the semi-annual conference meeting.

Although the session proper does not start until Friday morning, numerous preliminary meetings and caucuses were scheduled for today, including a meeting of the northern division representatives to work out the 1934 basketball schedule.

Many delegates including most of those coming from southern California, Idaho and Washington, arrived last night and immediately set out to evolve a working program for the session.

May Ban Broadcasting

It appeared that a definite decision on the question of broadcasting accounts of football games and other contents would be reached before the meeting adjourns Saturday. This question, long moot, has been discussed in other meetings, but action always has been deferred. A tentative football schedule for 1934 likely will be drawn up.

Ever want to ask a lot of questions of somebody or other when you were at a circus? Things that the program didn't tell anything about? An agent ahead of the Al G. Barnes circus came to town yesterday to say that it is to exhibit in Eugene on Wednesday, June 21.

He was asked to jot down some odd facts about the big show. Here they are:
Travels on three special trains.
Out of 200 places visited in a season less than 20 are played for more than one day.
Travels 20,000 miles in a summer.
Exhibits more than 1,000 jungle animals.
Carries more than 1,000 people on tour all of whom are given three meals each day in the circus dining tent.

Scores of ring-stock horses used in performances.
2,200 stakes driven and pulled each day.
A complete new set of canvas used each spring.
Tents contain 42 miles of rope.
Supposedly "untameable" zebras taught to draw a float in tournament.
Does not use local light plant, but carries its own dynamo wagons.
Has employees who have been with the show for many years.

As many acts shown in one performance as are given in many theaters in an entire season.
Sixty clowns running in age from 18 to 82 years old.
Always opens its season in California the third week in March. Gives its final performance in some one of the Pacific seaboard states late in November.
This year the circus is later than

usual in Eugene because of an unusual routing which is taking it up through Boise, Pocatello, Ontario, LaGrande, Pendleton, The Dalles, and back through Bend and Klamath Falls before cutting in toward the Willamette valley. The circus trains will be the first big passenger trains ever to operate over the Great Northern's new Central Oregon route through Bend to Klamath.

Life-Saving Course Offered at Summer Session at U. O.

Courses in life-saving that will lead to both life-saving certificates and examiner's certificates will feature the physical education program of the summer session of the University of Oregon at Eugene, it is announced. The swimming instruction will be a part of a well-rounded curricula of the school of physical education.

Swimming, diving and life-saving instruction for men will be under the direction of Howard S. Hoyman, instructor, and for women, under the direction of Miss Margaret M. Duncan, instructor. The university has two excellent swimming pools where instruction will be given, and for those who prefer to practice outside, the waters of the mill race and Willamette river offer opportunities.

Others who will be on the staff of the school of physical education for the summer include E. E. Knollin, associate professor; Miss Harriet W. Thomson, professor; Earl E. Boushaya, instructor, and E. Gail Royer, graduate assistant.
Classes will begin June 19 and last until July 28.
