

MORGAN HEARING STORY

Anne Morrow, was on the lower priced list, as were various of the Morgan partners. Her father, the late Senator Dwight Morrow, once a member of the firm also was on the list. Among those of the higher priced list were William H. Woodin, later to become secretary of the treasury, Owen D. Young, Charles D. Hilles, Silas Strauss, John J. Raskob, Charles E. Mitchell, Alfred P. Sloan Jr., Gerard Swope and Walter C. Teagle. Davis read a statement upholding the legality of the Lamont transactions, declaring "in all the revenue acts from 1918 to 1932, individuals have been allowed unlimited deductions from their incomes on account of losses actually sustained on the sale of securities or other property." Lamont testified that the repurchase of the stocks from his wife April 8, 1931, was direct. He added that he tore up his wife's note at the time and that he paid her no cash. "The market price at the time I bought these shares back," he said, "was within \$100 or \$200 of the price she paid for them." Ewing revealed that in 1928 he made short sales on behalf of trust accounts for his children. As trustee, he sold 4350 shares of Johns-Manville stock—making delivery by borrowing 1800 shares from his wife and the rest from himself.

"The president told us that no additional revenue would be needed until January and at that time the question of taxes could be taken up," he added. WASHINGTON, June 9. (P)—President Roosevelt's compromise proposal on veterans cuts has been accepted by the special house vet-

erans committee with clarifying modifications. The committee approved the compromise today at an executive session. It was subject to acceptance by the democratic steering committee, however, which was to meet later to consider the proposal. Representative Lea (D., Cal.), chairman of the democratic caucus that set up the special committee, said: "I believe the house will accept the compromise. It is better for the veterans than the Connally amendment to the independent offices appropriation bill. It is better thought out and worked out. "It is quite an improvement over the Connally amendment."

leaking gas line, which caused him to inhale fumes resulting in an intense sickness, also had to be repaired. Then he hoped to complete the seventh jaunt of his race against the world-flight time set in 1931 by Harold Gatty and Wiley Post, and subsequently to span the Pacific. Details of these plans, however, he has not recently divulged. (His hope of beating Post and Gatty apparently rests in his ability to reduce the time he is on the ground henceforth. Matten was about ten hours from Irkutsk—although it is not certain that he will go there—and should he reach that city in ten hours, he would be about 145 hours out of New York. Post and Gatty took about 92 hours to reach Irkutsk, but they were grounded a total of 52 hours at Blagovestshensk, Rha-Jarovsk, and Edmonton, Can., subsequently.)

July 28—Summer vegetables (cooked, their use and preparation. August 4—Summer salads. August 11—Summer desserts. August 18—Dish meals. August 25—Desserts. Sept. 1—Holiday planning leading up to Labor day. Sept. 8—Noon lunches (of special interest for women with children in school). Sept. 15—Seaside dinners. Sept. 22—Game dinners. Sept. 29—Cakes (or late fall canning if members of the Forum prefer).

To become a member of the Housewives Forum you have only to submit your menu or your recipes on the topic of the week. Your contribution must be mailed or brought to The Register-Guard office, not later than 6 p. m. on the Wednesday preceding the Friday for the discussion of the given topic. Your contribution must carry your name and address written plainly at the top of the first sheet of paper. You must write on one side of the paper only, but you may use either pen or soft black pencil. You must make your contribution as plain as possible.

of 50 cents each to be given either for particularly interesting menus or for recipes submitted under the menu plan.

For the present it is limited to the three-month period because this is the "critical season" in home planning and buying but it may be extended if need be.
