

JOHNNY GOODMAN LEADS IN OPEN; ARMOUR IS NEXT

GLEN VIEW, Ill., June 10.—(U.P.)—Little Johnny Goodman, 23-year-old ex-caddy from Omaha, Neb., was half-way up Bobby Jones' pedestal today.



With the greatest of ease, the 66 strokes 6 under par—ever registered by an amateur in national open competition, Goodman skyrocketed into the lead in the current tournament over the north shore course and entered the clubhouse at 11:30.

Goodman's phenomenal 66 yesterday was one of the most remarkable rounds of golf ever played by an amateur or a professional in big league competition and ear-marked the blonde-haired Nebraska youth as the nearest approach to another Bobby Jones in the amateur ranks.

Best Since Jones
Going into the last two rounds today, 18 holes in the morning and another 18 in the afternoon, Goodman had a 141, three under par for the first 36 holes, and the best chance any amateur has had to win the open title since Bobby Jones turned the trick in 1913 and then retired.

Golfing fame is not new to Goodman, but he has never won an important title in the six years he has been playing tournament golf. In 1929 he rocked the golf world by beating Bobby Jones in the first round of the national amateur at Pebble Beach. Last year he went to the final round of the national amateur at Five Farms, and lost to C. Ross Somerville, the Canadian.

It appeared that the title rested between four players—Goodman, Tommy Armour, Joe Kirkwood, the trick shot golfer and former Australian, and Olin Dutra, Brentwood Heights, Cal., P. G. A. champion.

FOXX AND GEHRIG IN HOME-RUN TIE

NEW YORK, June 10.—(U.P.)—Jimmy Foxx and Lou Gehrig rose to a home run tie with Babe Ruth yesterday when each garnered a four-bagger as New York geared out the Athletics, 7 to 6. Gehrig's blow came in the first inning with two aboard. Tony Lazzeri contributed a homer in the eighth with two on, to win the game. Foxx hit for the circuit in the seventh.

Washington kept pace with the leading Yankees by trouncing Boston, 7 to 2.

Luke Appling's home run in the 14th inning gave Chicago a 10 to 9 victory over Detroit.

In the National league, the St. Louis Cardinals replaced New York in first position by smothering Chicago, 12 to 2, while the Giants were idle.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, who had lost eight games in a row, celebrated Hans Wagner day by blanketing Cincinnati, 2 to 0, when Steve Swetone held the Reds to six hits.

These were the only games scheduled.

**First Exception
To Marriage Law
Is Recorded Here**

Two firsts were recorded at the marriage license bureau here Saturday—the first exception to the new license law and the first payment of the license fee in pennies.

Three hundred pennies, which the groom-to-be said he had been saving up for a long time for that purpose, were paid over the counter Saturday morning by Clifton Culp of Eugene. He was given a license to wed Miss Flora R. Perry, also of Eugene. Both are 23.

This is the first time in the memory of Mrs. Eva Duckworth, deputy clerk, who issues marriage licenses, that the fee has been paid with pennies.

In order to obtain the license Mr. Culp was compelled to obtain an order from County Judge Eick. Under the new law, which requires an interval of three days between the time of application for license and the time of issuing it, the county judge may, if circumstances warrant, make an order for the immediate issuance of the license. Mr. Culp said that all arrangements had been made for the marriage in Portland Saturday and that he had been mistaken in the date on which the new law went into effect.

HOLLYWOOD GOES INTO FIRST PLACE

A stubborn fight up through the ranks elevated the Hollywood Stars to the top of the Coast league pack of pennant contenders today.

The Stars dislodged the Portland Beavers from the coveted post by crowding out a 5 to 4 victory over Seattle while the Beavers were being nosed out by Missions last night, 4 to 3 in 11 innings.

Hollywood won despite being held to five hits by Hal Haid. Three Seattle errors and three walks turned the trick. The errors permitted all the Hollywood scores, three of which came in the sixth and the other two in the seventh. The Indians made a valiant effort to atone for their bobbles in the ninth but a single run was the most they could accomplish.

Portland likewise lost despite the fact it out-hit its opposition. The Beavers piled up 14 hits off Johnson and Osborne but the Missions were more effective in grouping their seven hits, garnered off Sam Gibson.

The Sacramento Senators continued their winning ways by again trouncing Los Angeles, 5 to 3. The Angels built up a slim lead in the third but a six-run attack in the sixth netted the Senators three runs and victory. Ballou held the winners to eight hits.

Bill Henderson allowed only four hits but was defeated by Oakland, 3 to 2. The San Francisco pitcher brought about his own downfall in the sixth when he yielded two hits and a pair of walks. Demaggio's home run produced both San Francisco runs in the second.

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AID TO ATHLETES IS ENDORSED AT COAST MEETING

SPOKANE, Wash., June 10.—(U.P.)

The necessity of financial assistance to athletes, with close supervision by university officials, was recognized by faculty representatives of the Pacific Coast conference at a meeting here last night.

Prof. W. B. Owen, of Stanford university, president of the conference, announced the decision, which he said was reached after study of the report by Jonathan Butler, who studied policies and practices of conference members.

"The conference recognizes," Prof. Owen said, "that financial aid to the extent of the students' needs is legitimate, but that certain safeguards to prevent abuse are necessary in the case of financial aid to athletes other than employment."

The graduate managers, in a separate meeting, agreed to limit freshman football competition, to reduce "top" prices for football games next fall, and to retain Herbert Dana, commissioner official, for an additional two years.

Plan Outlined

Prof. Owen outlined the future policy of the conference with respect to financial aid for athletes as follows:

"A. University or college shall investigate and approve aid on the basis of need."

"B. That the right to retain assistance be dependent upon the maintenance of a definite scholastic average not less than 'C' on a basis of A, B, C and D's passing grades."

"C. Scholarship, except those awarded primarily on a basis of superior scholastic attainment shall not be awarded to athletes in greater numbers than to non-athletes."

"D. Scholarships shall be bonafide payments to the university or college from outside source or paid from the income from established scholarship funds."

"E. No other financial aid to athletes other than employment given by persons other than those on whom the athletes are naturally dependent shall be approved except by vote of the conference."

Regarding freshman football competition he said it had been voted to limit it to six weeks and not more than four games shall be played with outside teams. Not more than two of these shall be with four-year institutions other than normal schools.

He also said that clarifying of the rules in regard to recruiting athletes was referred back to the committee for further study and report tomorrow.

Earl Campbell, graduate manager of the University of Washington and president of the graduate managers' association, said it was agreed that the efficient price 'top' will be reduced 15 to 20 per cent. A game that cost \$2.50 last year will be \$2.00 next fall, he said, and a \$5 game will be \$4.

Herbert Dana, commissioner of officials, gave an extensive report and Mr. Campbell said graduate managers were so pleased that they voted to extend his work for two years more.

er as a depositor, borrower or subscriber.

"Many persons, failing to realize that during prosperous times we had paid heavy taxes upon our profits, felt it to be unjust that during the last three years we have paid no income taxes; again failing to realize that our losses had more than wiped out our taxing income."

"As merchants of investment securities of established character, we do not consider that it is sound practice to offer common stock to the general public. It would not have been prudent banking to keep all these common stocks in our own portfolio. We wished to sell part of them as a business man's investment to those having knowledge of business and general conditions, who would share with ourselves the profit and the risk."

The meeting was adjourned, somewhat by Ralph Calk of Portland who arose to score the alumni of the university for the small percentage turning out for the meeting.

The alumni voted an honorary life membership to both Miss Jeannette Calkins and Alexander C. Brown, former secretaries of the group.

Dr. William Jasper Kew, chancellor of higher education, gave a short talk of welcome to the alumni, expressing appreciation for their interest in the institution.

A committee of three, to consist of Dean James H. Gilbert of the university, Carlton E. Spencer and Robert K. Allen, secretary of the alumni, was named by Mr. Angell for amending the constitution of the group.

More than 400 attended the commencement luncheon given at the Straub dormitory immediately following the dedication of the building. Mr. Angell presided as toastmaster.

Mrs. Jennie Spencer Luckey, Eugene, the 50-year graduate, was honored guest at the luncheon. Seated with her were Mrs. C. M. Collier, Eugene, class of '80, Miss Anne Whiteaker, Eugene, class of '81, and Miss Mary E. McCornack, Eugene, class of '82.
