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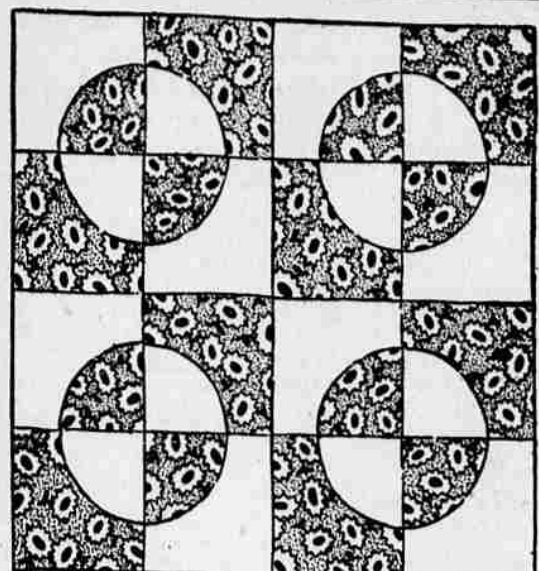
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PATCHWORK QUILT PATTERN

Contract Bridge

The hand given last Sunday is a simple game bid. South deals, not vulnerable.

North
♦ Q-9-7-3
♥ J-10-7
♦ 6-2
♠ A-7-5-3

West Never Bids East Never Bids
South
♦ A-J-10-6
♥ A-9
♦ A-9-5

The correct bidding:
1. South (1) North (2)
2. NT (3) 4 (4)
Pass

1. The Approach principle, bidding the suit in preference to no trump. This is explained at length below.

2. North has 3½ playing tricks in support of his partner's bid so gives him one raise.

3. With a hand as strong as this (4½ Honor tricks) and partner able to respond South sees game in the hand. He, therefore, bids three no trump, showing that his spade suit is of four cards only and leaving the decision as to the final contract to North.

4. North's hand would lose one trick in value at no trump (the ruff) and there is danger of the two weak suits so bids 4 spades. Four trumps in each hand is sufficient.

This hand shows very strongly the advisability of using the approach principle and bidding four card suits rather than no trump. If South had started the bidding with one no trump that would have been the final contract for North has no raise and three no trump or game cannot be made in spite of South's big hand.

Too many players start every hand that has the honor tricks, but no five or six card suit, with a no trump bid. They do not realize that a great portion of the time a suit bid is the only means to game and that the best declaration for the combined hands will be more easily found if the bidding starts with a suit bid.

Any hand containing the honor tricks for a bid and a biddable four card or longer suit should be started with the suit bid. A four card biddable suit of course means any suit of four cards which contains 1½ honor

tricks such as the above spade suit. Many players have heard that the balanced distributions, 4-3-3-3, and 4-4-3-2 play best at no trump. This is true to a certain extent, in that they are not very well suited to suit bids. However, one must realize that partner's hand may be slightly unbalanced and make a suit bid more advisable. Too, these balanced distributions require great honor strength (many stoppers in each suit) to make game at no trump.

If one is blinded by the fact that only nine tricks are required for a no trump game and because of its cheapness bid no trump on every occasion a great many games will be thrown away that should be made. The great potential strength in the ability to ruff losers is entirely lost sight of in the attempt to buy the contract at a price of nine instead of ten or eleven. Of course when deciding between a game at a minor (11 tricks) and no trump one must be sure that there will be available 2 extra tricks, but very often the game is there in a major suit (10 tricks) and will be found only a mirage at no trump.

Therefore, make this a principle that you always follow: whenever you have a chance between a biddable suit and a no trump, always bid the suit even if it is a four card minor, no matter what the distribution of your hand. If you have been in the habit of bidding no trump at every opportunity and now start using the Approach principle you will find your name appearing more often in the winning column.

Here is another double dummy problem. Spades are trumps. South leads and makes all seven tricks.
