and police officers, L. J. Sausser, foreman of the Irving section crew, and Arthur Anderson, Junction City, member of the crew, notified officials. Dean is being held in the jail here as a witness for the inquest.

No papers or anything to identify the dead man were found on the body or in the pack. The body was lying between mile posts 656 and 657, 333 feet south of culvert 657-C. The bundle of bedding and articles carried by the man was found about a mile from the body, near a school house. The bedding was said to be clean and well kept, the blood being found on the canvas around the blankets. Silverware for eating and toilet articles were wrapped inside the blankets. There was no indication he had been robbed.

Mr. Poole, coroner, Officer H. W. Howard from the state police office, and George Canaday from the sheriff's office made the investigation.

The dead man was between 35 and 40 years, the coroner reported, weighed about 155 pounds, was about six feet tall, had light blue eyes and was generally of fair complexion.

Examination of the body was being continued during the afternoon, a doctor and a dentist being called in by the coroner. The man had been dead but a few hours when found.

specifically set forth that the debt should not be cancelled or reduced.

"Under my constitutional power, and in accordance with the terms of the policy which I have set forth, I can entertain representations of the British government concerning the entire debt settlement and the British government has requested that such opportunity be afforded."

"I have, therefore, suggested to them that such representations be made in Washington as soon as convenient."

"As a matter of information to the American public, I want to make it clear that the economic conference now being held in London does not include in its program any consideration of the debts owed by various governments to the United States. The American delegates have been instructed not to discuss debts with the representatives of any of the debtor governments."

The British note, dated June 13, complained that war debts were "harrasing" delegates to the economic conference and were a deterring factor in world recovery.

The British owed the United States tomorrow \$75,950,000.

It was disclosed in the note that they had some time ago asked for a postponement of the June 15 payment.

Eugene, engineers said. One is to follow the present road, seeking a higher location to avoid floods, while the other would skirt the west and south boundaries of the city, follow the so-called Alder street pass south of here and hit the highway south of Goshen or still further south near Walker.

The latter route would bring the highway into the city near the southwest corner of the airport, follow the Loran highway to Willamette street, and then bear southeastward to the Alder street road south of the city.

State engineers said Wednesday this route had not been definitely abandoned, but the feeling was that the road should follow the old one more closely south of Eugene and join at Goshen.

The commission also ordered a reconnaissance survey of the north Unquah highway as requested in a letter from B. L. Eddy of Roseburg. The survey would be made by the engineers of the highway department rather than by the bureau of public roads, as requested.

Many requests for widening, construction of secondary highways and for bridges were rejected by the commission with the usual remark "no funds."

The five bridges along the Oregon coast highway, if constructed under the jurisdiction of the state highway commission and with borrowed federal funds, will be toll bridges, and not free. This was made known when the commissioners were confronted with communications from the Coast highway association suggesting toll-free spans.
