

C. C. C. ROAD WORK IN SIUSLAW FOREST SECTION OUTLINED

One of the most important projects to be handled by the men of the Civilian Conservation Corps stationed at Cape Creek camp in the northwestern corner of Lane county is the construction of a road east along the ridge between Cape Creek and the Yachats river toward Cummins peak, it was announced Thursday by R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest.

Mr. Shelley said that it is hoped to finish this road this summer and that if weather conditions are favorable this goal will undoubtedly be reached before the six months term of enrollment of the O. C. C. men expires. The distance to be covered is seven miles and there is considerable heavy construction to do.

Another road to be built this summer is on the divide between Buck creek on the Yachats river, known as the Yachats road, and the grading on the Ten Mile Indian creek road will be finished this summer. This road was practically put through last year but it needs clearing and widening and otherwise improving.

From the Grass Valley camp on the Alsea river the C. C. C. crews will work on a road on the divide between Drift creek and the Alsea, covering a distance of four miles, and on another road on the divide between Fall creek and the north fork of the Alsea in the Table mountain country.

A lookout house on Grass mountain will also be built by men from this camp, Mr. Shelley said.

New \$5 License Tags Appear Here

The first of the new \$5 license tags appeared on a number of Eugene automobiles Thursday, this being the first day on which they were allowed to be used.

The new tags have black figures and letters on an orange background and the date of expiration, December 31, 1933, is printed below the number of the license instead of above it as in the case of the old tags.

The new license is good for only six months but beginning January 1, 1934, the \$5 fee will be good for a whole year.

to attend the meeting as the code vitally affects their business, it was said.

Several of the smaller mills about the county are operating on a conservative basis now and two larger mills, the Woodard Lumber company and the Chambers plant, both of Cottage Grove, are ready to start turning out more lumber soon, it was reported here this week.

A noticeable upturn in the industry has been noted, one reason being that many yard owners are taking advantage of present low prices to stock their yards, according to H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association.

Demand for labor in the industry also is better, according to Frank L. Armitage, of the United States employment service here. Labor in mills and for logging operations has shown an increase recently, he stated.

DOLLAR AND POUND STABILIZATION SEEN

LONDON, June 13.—(AP)—British financial quarters were inclined to the opinion that stabilization of the dollar and pound for the duration of the world economic conference virtually was accomplished today as the dollar steadied close to a quotation of \$4.05 to the pound.

The \$4.05 quotation was widely rumored as the point on which it was agreed to start stabilization.

The pound had been substantially higher earlier in the day.

The steps to be taken to accomplish de facto stabilization have been the subject of much speculation, both in banking quarters and the world economic conference, but it was understood experts are working out a formula which will include virtual cessation of foreign exchange speculation.

Scion of British Royalty Comes to Eugene For Visit

Henry Holden Colpus, who declares he is the son of King Edward VII of England, Prince de Guelph and pretender to the throne of England, is in Eugene for a few days.

Colpus is an American citizen, veteran of two American wars, was butler for President Cleveland and is a pensioner of the United States government. Yet by rights, he declares, he should be King Henry IX of England.

When King Edward VII was Prince of Wales he married a beautiful Englishwoman, charming and aristocratic but far beneath him in station. A son was born, Queen Victoria, his august mother, annulled the marriage. The son was Henry. Later the boy's mother married again, this time to Henry Colpus, and the boy took his stepfather's name. This is Colpus' story.

Henry came to the United States early in life and found employment in addition to being a White House butler for President Cleveland, he served in that capacity for J. P. Morgan and John Jacob Astor, he says.

Colpus makes no pretense of ever forcing any claim to the English throne, being content to remain an American citizen.

ber of republicans leaped to demand an immediate vote on the Steiwer-Cutting amendment attached last night on a 51 to 39 senate count.

Before the main vote could be reached, the house had to dispose of many other senate amendments, accepting some and rejecting others.

The house reduced to \$500,000 the senate-approved amendment to provide \$1,000,000 for payment to state institutions for care of veterans suffering from neuro-psychiatric ailments.

Non-Service Thrown Out

Representative Woodrum said there were sufficient facilities in federal institutions to care for veterans, but that a compromise was agreed upon because some veterans were in state institutions and it would be better to leave them there. He disclosed that Senator Disterich (D., Ill.) author of the amendment, said \$500,000 was sufficient.

The house rejected the Black amendment to provide \$1,000,000 for hospital facilities for veterans with non-service connected illnesses. The vote was 162 to 23.

The house approved the Tydings amendment for care and treatment of veterans of any war, including the Boxer rebellion and the Philippine insurrection, suffering from disability or ailments suffered in line of duty.
