

COUNTY WARRANTS BEING TAKEN UP

A good sized payment of warrants on the general fund of Lane county is expected to be made in the near future, it was announced Friday by Grace Schiska, county treasurer, and market road warrants up to No. 9508, bringing them down to June 1, and warrants on the special road fund up to No. 1329 and bringing them down to April 19, will be paid in a few days. The amounts to be paid on the market road and special road funds approximate \$22,000. The treasurer said that she expects more money in soon to pay for more warrants about July 1.

Mrs. Schlaka, Friday sent out \$2,868.54 to different school districts in the county and \$10,178.25 to the schools the day before.

Tax money is coming in at about the same rate as it did this time last year, Lloyd Howe, tax deputy in the office of the sheriff, says.

A COMPANY THIRTY YEARS OLD

This week Friday the Ford Motor Company completes 30 years of automobile making.

It is also my fortieth year at the same job. I made my first engine in 1893, and it still runs. This is the engine that won the Selden Patent Suit—which took the motor car out of the exclusive class, and opened the automobile industry to hundreds of manufacturers who started during the last 30 years.
