"King of Jazz" Playing Colonial; "Sailor's Luck" At Rex; Comedy At State

Hailed as "the greatest thrill on wheels," the moving picture version of the last great eruption of the volcano, "Krakatoa," will be shown at the Colonial theatre for three days starting Sunday together with the 1933 edition of Paul Whiteman's "King of Jazz," the musical picture in technicolor. 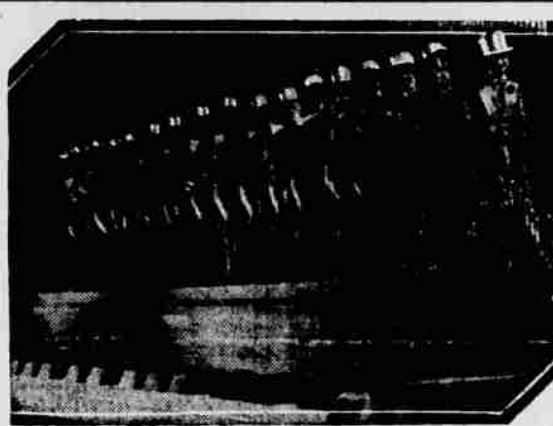
