

Louisiana State Wins Track Meet; Oregon Athletes Make Good Showing

STARR SECOND IN CENTURY; DEMARIS THIRD IN JAVELIN

CHICAGO, June 17.—(AP)—Out of a barrage of flying spikes that tore four accepted world records to bits, a surprising team from Louisiana State tonight turned in the most amazing upsets of the season by defeating Southern California's Trojans for the national intercollegiate track and field championships at Soldier Field, 55 to 54.

Indiana, winner of the 1932 championship, finished third with 37 points, with Stanford fourth with 26 3/4. Michigan, the western conference champion, was fifth with 24 3/4, while Illinois State normal and Kansas tied for sixth with 22 apiece. Marquette was seventh with 20 6/7, Oregon eighth with 20, Nebraska ninth with 16, and the Colorado Aggies, tenth with 14. Forty teams shared in the scoring.

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SOLDIER FIELD, Chicago, June 17.—(AP)—Glenn Cunningham, Kansas university's sensational middle distance runner tonight sped to a new American record for the mile run, winning the event over a brilliant field in four minutes, 9.8 seconds. Jumping his field at the half mile mark, Cunningham set his own pace to win by about 45 yards over Lyle Hutton of Illinois State Normal.

Ralph Metcalfe of Marquette university won the 100-yard dash in 9.4, equalling the NCAA and world records set by Frank Wykoff, Southern California, in 1930. Paul Starr of the University of Oregon, placed second and James Johnson of Illinois State Normal, third.

Coming up with a characteristic rush during the last half of the race, Metcalfe pulled away to beat out Paul Starr of Oregon, by nearly two yards.

Jimmy Johnson, Illinois State Normal, was third inches behind Starr, with the Southern California pair, Ball and Parsons, taking the next two places. Hudson Helmholtz of Illinois was sixth.

Oregon University, represented by only two men, collected 20 points to take eighth place in the meet. Paul Starr, the Webfoot ace dash man, won second in the 100-yard dash, and third in the 220-yard dash. In both instances it was Ralph Metcalfe, the Marquette flash, who came in first.

Metcalfe had to equal the world record of 9.4 seconds to best Starr in the 100. W. Demaris, the other Oregon entrant, buried the javelin 209 feet 7 1/2 inches to place third in that event. Duane Purvis of Purdue was first with a throw of 216 feet 6 1/4 inches and C. Sample of Arizona second with 211 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

Eugene having previously secured a win over Albany on Memorial day, by a fairly good-sized score, when the locals battled Lefty Bogie, Portland Beaver rookie, for a total of 15 hits, which, with poor support, was good for 11 runs. Albany, on the other hand, was unsuccessful in winning over the league-leading Wolves' Federals by the close score of 3-2, and will be over here to make it two straight.

HIGHCLIMBER Takes pm over

Mr. Charlie Orr and Mr. Ray Sims are out two glasses and one glass (respectively) of a popular new beverage. Bob Wiltshire and not Cecil Inman gets credit for last Sunday's pitching victory over Salem.

L. H. Gregory, Oregonian sports editor and recognized baseball authority, has settled the argument. This department happened to be on the winning side and it's just a question now of running down Orr and Sims. Here's what Gregory has to say on the matter:

An interesting case came up in Eugene the other day that illustrates another of the basic rules of crediting games.

Eugene was playing Salem, and Eugene was behind, 4 to 6, at the opening of the ninth. "Bob Wiltshire had pitched the eight innings for Eugene," as Roy Craft tells it in his Highclimber column in the Register-Guard, "but retired in favor of Charlie Orr, a pinch hitter, at the start of the ninth. Orr got a hit and was replaced on first by Cotter Gould, who ran for him."

"Four runs were eventually scored by Eugene in that inning and, as Salem came to bat in the last half of the ninth, Eugene led, 8 to 6. Cecil Inman went in and held Salem scoreless, giving Eugene the game."

The argument promptly grew hot in Eugene as to whether Wiltshire or Inman should be credited with the victory.

"It appears that Wiltshire should get credit for the victory," to quote Craft again, "since Inman did not go into the game until the score favored Eugene. On the other hand, while Wiltshire had retired with the score against him, he was replaced by a pinch hitter and was not really replaced by another pitcher until the start of the ninth."

Mr. Craft really answers his own question in that paragraph. Yes, indeed, Wiltshire gets the credit. The reason being that one of the basic rules of crediting victories is that a pitcher always is entitled to any runs scored by his team where he, or a pinch hitter for him, is at bat.

Thus, just as Mr. Craft says, Wiltshire, as represented by a pinch hitter, was not really out of the game as a batter until Inman took the mound after Eugene had scored its runs. You

never will go wrong on it if you remember that a pitcher always gets any runs his team scores when a pinch hitter bats for him.

People are still talking about last Thursday's wrestling match. In the opinion of many persons attending, it was the greatest bout ever staged in the army, not excepting the Jack Reynolds-Wildcat Pete go last fall. The local arena was jammed to the roof, with the biggest crowd in the history of Eugene wrestling wildly applauding as the Sailor wrestled Thor Jensen for the final fall.

It was an all-around all-star card, and the preliminary between Logger Hiebert and Gorilla Pogi of the Argentine was in a main event class. Pogi, the walnut colored grappler from the South, looks the part more than any wrestler we have ever seen. As he sat in his corner waiting for the match to start, he resembled a George Bellows lithograph. But, even as clothes do not make the man, appearances do not make the wrestler, and the white-skinned, slender logger won the best two falls from his dark opponent.

Local fans who have frequently berated the wrestling ability of Thor Jensen, should have been converted Thursday. The Elkon grappler may use plenty of unorthodox tactics, he may go for the ropes too often, but he knows plenty of wrestling, and they don't come any smarter. To combat the Sailor's vicious chin-lock, Thor developed one of his own, and used it very effectively. His reverse headlocks were far from amateurish, and his own peculiar brand of whip wristlock and flying mare served him in good stead.

After the match, Jensen admitted, for the first time in his local history, that he was licked. However, he appended the hope that they might meet again. Which isn't a bad idea. We can imagine nothing more satisfying than another return match. It should be just as much of a thriller as the last one, and it should pack in almost as many fans. Its a toss-up who might come out winner in a third go. Jensen really had a fair shot last week for loss, and, strangely, didn't use it. When the Sailor sonenberged him while he was standing outside the ropes, Thor scraped his back on the chairs, leaving a long diagonal cut, which was very painful, and probably handicapped him to some extent.

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Oregon-O.S.C. Game Will Be Portland Tilt

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—Portland will be the scene of the 1933 football game between the University of Oregon and Oregon State College. The game will be played at the civic stadium here on Armistice day.

This decision was reached here tonight at a meeting attended by Hugh E. Rossen, director of athletics at Oregon university; Carl Lodell, graduate manager and director of athletics at Oregon State, and James J. Richardson, manager of the stadium, and John Laing, first president of the stadium association and its present secretary.

It will be the first time in 16 years that the two schools will have settled their annual football argument on a Portland field. The classic was last played here Thanksgiving day, 1917.

The game, those who arranged it said, is a "good will offering" to citizens of the Portland district who have supported the teams of the two schools.

The 1934 game will be played in Eugene and the 1935 game in Corvallis, Lodell and Rossen said.

In order to make possible the playing of the game here on Armistice day, it was necessary to transfer the Oregon-Utah and the Oregon State-Washington State games. The Oregon-Utah tilt, originally scheduled for the civic stadium here November 5, will be played at Eugene or Salt Lake City. The Washington State-Oregon State contest, also scheduled for the stadium, will be played at Corvallis.
