

MEN IN ALL C. C. C. CAMPS SEE FOREST MOVING PICTURES

Men in all the C. C. C. camps in Oregon will be entertained with motion pictures and a lecture, illustrated with slides of forestry subjects. A. J. Jackson of the United States forest service and W. F. Fuller from the state forester's office were in Eugene Monday with the "Show Boat," a motor truck maintained jointly by the national and state forest service, and they will give their entertainment in the camps of the Eugene area during the next few weeks.

It is an educational show, given with the idea of showing the men in the camps, especially the men new to the state, how the work they are engaged in ties in with the forest program.

The "Show Boat" has been taken to seven camps in the Mt. Hood area already and this week will be taken to the Quartzville, Seven-Mile Hill, Breitenbush, Mary Creek and Little North Fork camps in the Santiam section, probably coming to the Lane county camps next week.

These programs have been given in the state for the last seven years and Mr. Fuller estimated that a million persons have been entertained by them in that time. The pictures and lectures have been given in every school of consequence in the state and have been presented in Eugene a number of times, once at the different high schools and at the service club meetings.

One day last week Mr. Fuller and Mr. Jackson presented the entertainment before 500 Four-H club members now attending the summer school at the state college at Corvallis.

Dr. Titus Will Conduct Clinic At National Meet

Dr. Harry W. Titus, Eugene dentist, will conduct one of the clinics for the national convention of the American Dental Association in Chicago, August 7-12. Dr. Titus will be leaving about August 2 or 3 for Chicago. To be placed on the program is an outstanding honor since there are some 50,000 dentists in the association.

His clinic will be entitled "Alveolotomy and Mouth Packing." He is giving the clinic for the general practitioner rather than for the specialist, since the bulk of the 15,000 attending the convention will be general dentists. The purpose of the clinic will be to show these general dentists how simple this procedure of work is and how it can be done in the ordinary office with as few as three or four instruments and by one dentist with general knowledge and experience.

Dr. Titus will take with him several casts in stone and aluminum finished in color. The casts are of mouth conditions done in actual cases by Dr. Titus and will show the progress of alveolotomy and mouth packing when properly done.

Copies of the program for the convention have been received here. The meeting is called the Chicago Centennial Dental Congress of the American Dental Association. This is the 70th annual meeting of the American society.

OLD-TIME RACES TO BE HELD HERE

Old-time races, with merchandise prizes for the winners, will be held on Willamette street as a feature of the big Fourth of July celebration to be held here this summer. W. N. Wintler, general chairman, announced Saturday.

Willamette street will be closed to traffic for a time during the day and the races will start at 3 o'clock. Anyone is invited to enter. There will be potato races, three-legged races, fat men's race, skinny men's race, a tug-of-war and all the old-time sports which are appropriate to Fourth celebrations.

Another feature of the celebration will be a mining display being arranged by the Western Oregon Mining congress under the direction of George Jennings, president of the congress. Miners from Marion, Linn, Lane and Douglas counties will exhibit ores, mining equipment and conduct demonstrations of gold recovery and gold panning.

This will be entirely an educational display with no stock selling, no literature distributed and no "sales talks" of any kind allowed, Jennings declared.

The publicity committee working on the event recently completed a tour of all cities and towns between here and the California line and report a wide-spread interest in the celebration. The committee will next cover towns north of here and on the coast.

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ELECTION NOTICES SENT OUT TO LANE JUDGES AND CLERKS

Besides the election of delegates to the state convention for the ratification or rejection of the amendment to the constitution of the United States, repealing the 18th amendment, six measures referred to the people by the legislature, one proposed by initiative petition and two on referendum ordered by petition of the people will be voted upon by the people of Lane county at the special election July 21.

Notices of the election were sent out Saturday by County Clerk Dillard to the judges and clerks of election in the different precincts of the county. Besides the choosing of the six delegates to the state convention the voters will cast their ballots upon the following questions:

Referred to the people by the legislative assembly: Soldiers and sailors bonus amendment; county manager form of government; constitutional amendment; prosecution by information and grand jury modification amendment; debt and taxation limitations for municipal corporations; constitutional; state power fund bonds; sales tax bill.

Proposed by initiative petition: Repeal of prohibition amendment to the constitution of Oregon.

Referendum ordered by petition of the people: Oleomargarine tax bill; granite power bill.

VOLCANO PICTURES THRILL EUGENEANS

Theater goes Sunday at the Colonial found not only lively music, gorgeous scenes all in beautiful technical color, and the snappy entertainment provided by Paul Whiteman, Bing Crosby, John Boles, Slim Summerville and numerous others in "King of Jazz" but were genuinely thrilled by the added attraction "Krakatoa." The subject "Krakatoa" depicted the activities of the volcano by the same name off the coast of Java, and the scenes actually show the volcano in action. Huge masses of earth, water and steam are hurled over a mile into the air, and the effect is indescribably beautiful, yet awesome, those who saw it declare.

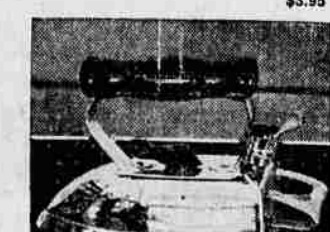

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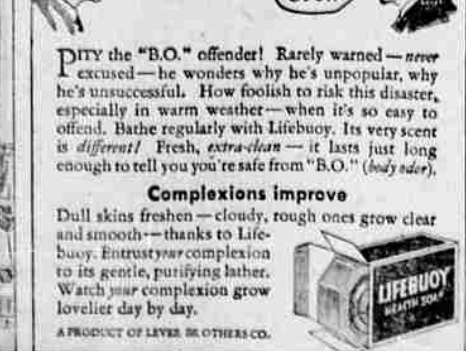
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
