HEALTH SURVEY STORY CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE Thoroughness of reporting morbidity, mortality and other vital statistics.

Sanitary nuisances will be another topic treated in the survey, reporting on odors, dusts, rubbish and general cleanliness, empty lots and camps, flies and mosquitoes, rats and vermin, smoke, unnecessary noises, criticism with suggested methods of improvement along these lines.

Having conditions will be studied, including general appearance and condition of dwellings, ventilation and lighting of the office buildings.

Another section will be given over to communicable diseases, the students to give a list of diseases requiring notification by the board of health, quarantine regulations, methods of disinfection and fumigation, and reports on prevalent diseases and their methods of control.

Schools will be written up, the students to present a general inspection as to ventilation, lighting, temperature, playgrounds, etc.; a report on the medical inspection of children and how it is conducted; and a report on the diseases for which children are excluded from school.

The miscellaneous section in the report will take up markets, provision stores and soda fountains, slaughter houses and meat inspection, cold storage plants, kitchens of hotels and restaurants, wharves, barber shops, food and drug administration.
