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GIANTS BUILD UP
LEAD BY 3-0 WIN

NEW YORK, June 20.—The league-champion Chicago Cubs contributed to the Giants' shutout total by being blanked Sunday and again yesterday, 3 to 0. It made a total of 26 consecutive innings in which Giants didn't permit a run.

This victory extended the Giants' league lead to one and a half games over St. Louis, which was nosed out, 6 to 5, by Brooklyn. The Cards out-hit the Dodgers, 15 to 10, but couldn't handle their safeties.

A four-run sport in the seventh enabled the last place Phillies to down Cincinnati, 8 to 7, although out-hit by the Reds 14 to 12.

Pittsburgh at Boston was played in a double-header Sunday.

The New York Yankees' American league lead was pared to a bare half-game over Washington when the Yanks dropped their ninth contest out of 13 starts on the present road trip to Chicago, 4 to 3. The Chi-Sox bunched five of their 10 hits for the four runs in the fourth.

Boston rose out of the cellar with a 5 to 2 win over Cleveland when George Piggas held the Indians to five hits, while Brown, Hudlin and Crashead allowed Boston 10.

St. Louis sank into the cellar when crushed 10 to 4 by Washington. Detroit rose to a fifth-place tie with Philadelphia by beating the Athletics, 9 to 4.

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HIGHCLIMBER
Takes pm over

With the announcement from Joe Waterman, Portland promoter, that he has signed Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion, for a battle with Ah Wing Lee, ex-Eugene Chinese fighter, local fans are turning their attention to the Canzoneri-Ross lightweight title scrap at Chicago this week.

Whether Tony loses his title or not, he will come to Portland in August for a go with Lee, better known here as Jimmy Lee. The Chinese boy attended the University of Oregon and got his start on the armory fight cards. He is now Portland's biggest drawing card and recognized as one of the best lightweights on the coast.

Canzoneri, the little Italian from New Orleans, will have one of his toughest scraps against Barney Ross this week. Ross is a Chicago boy who has rocketed through the ranks of the lightweights in the past two years. He is a Hebrew—Rasofsky is real name—and he got his start in amateur fights. He fought in 150 amateur bouts and won all but one, 45 of them by knockouts. Finally he won the national amateur flyweight championship.

Since turning pro, Ross has had 45 or 50 professional bouts and in the last year he has whipped some of the toughest boys in the game. Bat Battalino, former feather champ, went down to defeat before Barney, as did Billy Petrolle, the Fargo express. Both battles were hard-fought affairs but Petrolle did not prove as tough for Ross as did Battalino.

Canzoneri, on the other hand, is one of the greatest little 135-pounders ever to enter the ring. He first held the lightweight title and then climbed to lightweight and junior welter titles. His great battles have earned him a reputation as a vicious fighter and the crowds like to see him. There's no laying down on the job when Canzoneri is in the ring.
