Gas Consumption
In Oregon Shown
By Highway Chart

Gasoline consumption in the state of Oregon for the first four months of the calendar year 1933 was an increase of 664,717 gallons over consumption in the same period last year, figures compiled by John Beakey, traffic engineer for the state highway department indicate.

Consumption this year was 47,638,368 gallons as compared to 46,973,651 last year.

The consumption for the first ten months of the license year 1932-1933 showed a decrease of 8,352,286 gallons from that of the preceding year, however. Consumption this year was 125,625,236 gallons while last year the figure for the same period was 133,977,522.

On a chart of gasoline consumption for the period from February, 1919 to the present, a steady increase in consumption of gasoline in the state up to 1931 is shown, with a dropping off for 1932. In the period from February, 1919 to January, 1920, 31,812,113 gallons were used in the state and in 1931-32, 170,339,112 gallons were consumed. From January, 1932 to June 1933, consumption totaled 155,615,158 gallons.

MORRIS, DREW ARE ELECTED TO BOARD

With a total of 102 persons casting their ballots, the Eugene city school district election was completed here Monday night with Dr. Victor P. Morris, of the university, and Earl M. Drew being elected to the school board for three year terms.

These two were the only candidates for the two vacant positions, Dr. Morris taking the place of Dr. H. W. Titus, retiring after serving two terms, and Drew starting his second term.

At a meeting of the board following the election, the two were given the oath of office.

Edward F. Bailey was elected chairman of the board and Mrs. A. E. Lundy re-elected clerk. Mrs. Lundy has been clerk for the past five years and the board, in electing her for the sixth year, expressed appreciation for her services.

Dollar Day Fares Listed For Fourth

With Dollar Day fares in effect over the fourth of July for the first time, the Southern Pacific Company yesterday announced plans for extensive travel in connection with the national holiday this year.

The low-fare program, featuring cent-a-mile transportation, will embrace the five-day period, June 30 to July 4, with return limit of July 11, according to A. J. Gillette, agent for the company here.

All stations on the railroad's lines in the territory from San Francisco to Salt Lake City, and from Portland to El Paso are to be included in the holiday offer, it was stated.

CLUB MEMBERS OF LANE COUNTY BUSY AT SUMMER SCHOOL

Twenty-five members of the 4-H club of Lane county are among the 350 club boys and girls and 40 leaders completing a busy two weeks junior summer session at Oregon State College.

Eleven members of the Lane county delegation hold scholarships to the club summer session as a result of winnings made during the past year. Others are paying their own expenses, largely with money made in their club projects.

Johnston of Norton, for instance, sold 1200 pounds of McKay Dent seed corn raised as a part of their club work last year, making money enough to not only pay their summer session fees but to buy all their clothes as well.

For nearly two weeks now the delegates from Lane county have been following a regular morning schedule of class work, going in sections from building to building on the campus, getting the latest instruction from the regular college faculty members on a score of subjects ranging from the fundamentals of livestock and crop management for the boys and homesteading for the girls, to such interesting specialties as photography, radio, fire prevention, journalism and music for all of them.

Once a day special speakers appear before the general assemblage, then there is an afternoon of sports and various kinds of recreation, followed by educational and entertaining movies or other programs in the evening. The group has a regularly organized system of self-government with Stone, wall Jackson of Canby heading the boys' council and Alice Welbes of Gresham the girls.
