Lane's Quota at C. M. T. C. Is Cut

Lane county's quota of young men to be sent to the C. M. T. C. camp at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., may be cut down to about eight, according to Major Van Svarverud of the United States army reserve corps, who has charge of enrolling the youths from this section.

Wednesday Major Svarverud received a letter from First Lieutenant Thomas J. Cross, adjutant at the camp, stating that the entire quota had been cut from 390 to 290, a reduction of 40 1/2 per cent, and that the financial problem of transporting the men to and from camp will be difficult as the budget has been cut heavily.

The camp is scheduled to be under way by June 23.

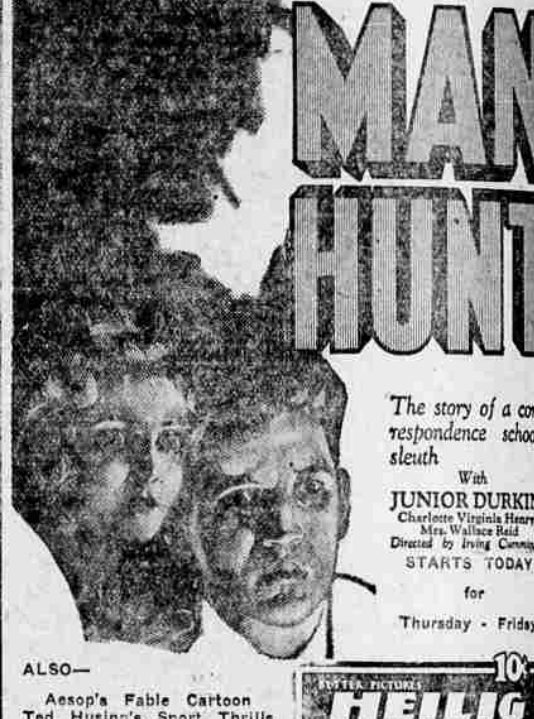
