

Beauty And The Beast To Meet In Armory

NEW YORK ADONIS TO MEET HIEBERT IN EUGENE MATCH

Sammy Cohen, New York wrestler and model for many famous artists and sculptors, will mix with Harold "True Blue" Hiebert, rough and tough logger from St. Helens, in the main event on tonight's wrestling program at the armory.



The handsome Cohen, rated by artists as the world's most perfectly built athlete and ranked by the national wrestling association as one of the 10 best grapplers in the middleweight division, will form a striking contrast to the large-boned Hiebert whom Nature built for utility rather than for beauty of form and face.

Cohen did not arrive in town Wednesday as planned but Herb Owen, promoter, expected him here early Thursday morning. Local mat fans were anxiously awaiting a glance at this Jewish grappler who is said to excel in so many departments.

Bulldog Jackson, of Klamath Falls, will meet Dickie Moore, of Everett, Wash., in the 45-minute special event. Otis Clingman had been booked to meet Jackson but a back injury suffered in his match with Jensen was aggravated this week in a match with the Japanese in Portland and Clingman asked for a few days rest.

Moore is a flashy, middleweight whom Owen has been planning to show here and the promoter wired him to come to Eugene for his first appearance against Jackson. Owen gives his personal promise that this match will be a knock-down-and-drag-out affair from start to finish.

The Odd Fellows band will play a concert in the armory from 8 to 8:30 and will also play during intermissions.

SWIMMING, TENNIS COURSES STARTED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(AP)—Richard Stahl of Berlin and Wong Bock Cheung, Chinese, wrestled two hours to a draw in the main event of last night's grappling matches here. Stahl, at 218, had an eight-pound advantage over his opponent.

Perhaps when the Sharkey-Carnera go is over, Dempsey will step into the Garden as matchmaker and put Baer against the champion, whomever he may be.

Tommy Loughran Stages Comeback In Beating Hamas

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Tommy Loughran, the old master of ring strategy, is back in the fistie line tonight again. He no longer is regarded as a contender for championships of any kind, but after being regarded as "all through" a half dozen times, he was knocked out by Jack Sharkey four years ago, he has returned to the "big time" and big crowds with a ten round decision over his old rival, Steve Hamas.

Carrying on a quiet comeback campaign, Loughran staged perhaps the greatest comeback of them all before 10,000 excited fans at the Yankee Stadium last night. For eight rounds he barely staved off the rushes of the fiery Wallington, N. J., youngster, absorbing quite a bit of punishment. He gave Hamas a lesson in the use of the straight arm such as Steve never received on the Penn State football field, poking his left into Hamas' face with almost monotonous regularity, but that wasn't quite enough.

Then in the ninth, bleeding from cuts over both eyes and apparently not far from a knockout, Loughran suddenly switched from boxing to fighting. He rocked Hamas' head back with hard rights and lefts, slugging and swiping on even terms and won the last two rounds and a close decision.

TRADES BENEFIT LEAGUE OUTFITS; CONTEST IS CLOSE

The last minute trades by which several national league clubs endeavored to gain strength for the mid-season struggles appears, at first glance, to have panned out exceedingly well.

Notable among them was the switch which sent Lefty O'Doul to the New York Giants and Sam Leslie to the Brooklyn Dodgers, both the Boston Philadelphia deal, involving Pinky Whitney, Hal Lee, Wes Schulmerich and Fritz Knothe also seems to have been beneficial to both teams.

O'Doul, who wasn't hitting at all with the Dodgers, again made himself an important figure with the bat yesterday when, for the second time since the June 15 trade, he paced the New Yorkers to a victory that helped them hold the lead in the elder circuit. Lefty made two hits as the Giants downed the Chicago Cubs, 3-1, in a brilliant mound duel between Fred Fitzsimmons and Pat Malone, and one was a home run that put New York ahead to stay.

Leslie's clouting already has won a couple of games for the Dodgers, but he couldn't do much yesterday as the St. Louis Cardinals, after giving away five runs in the first inning, came back to win 7-5 and remain a half game behind the Giants.

Whitney, the leading figure in the trade between the Braves and the Phillies, got a new job at second base yesterday when the veteran Rabbit Maranville was benched and Dick Gyselman was put in at third. He not only filled the bill, but he hit three home runs and batted in five runs as the Braves took both ends of a doubleheader from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-5 and 5-3.

The Phil's new acquisitions, Schulmerich and Knothe, batted in six of the ten counts Philadelphia scored in the fourth and seventh innings to beat Cincinnati, 10-8.

In the American league, Washington's so far unsuccessful pursuit of the New York Yankees again furnished the day's high spots as both teams won and remained a game and a half apart.

The Senators had little trouble downing the Chicago White Sox, 9-0 as they uncorked an 18-hit assault, including four home runs, Manager Joe Cronin, while Earl Whitwell kept the Sox hitting scattered. The Yankees, however, had to go 13 innings to beat the last-place St. Louis Browns, 5-3, despite Lou Gehrig's 17th home run of the season and Tony Lazzeri's 12th.

The Cleveland Indians continued their winning streak with more flashy pitching as Wes Ferrell pitched the Philadelphia Athletics to six safeties while his mates pounded George Earnshaw for an 11-1 triumph.

The Boston Red Sox split a doubleheader, the Sox winning the opening slugfest, 10-0 with the aid of a five-run rally in the sixth and the Tigers coming back to get a 5-3 victory behind Fred Marberry's good flinging.

BEAVERS DEFEAT SEATTLE, 8 TO 6

This was not quite enough to win and the champion Beavers marked up their second straight victory 8-6. Lou Kouppel pitched the Portland victory and along with his battery mate, Earl Sheely, hit for the circuit.

The Oaks couldn't field last night but they could hit and that was enough to give them a 13-6 decision at Sacramento. Though booting five chances in the field, the Oaks backed up Pitcher Roy Joiner with 18 singles, including a pair of doubles and a single by Archie Uhalt and three singles by Archie Veltman.

With Dick Ward fanning eight Stars and allowing but seven hits, Los Angeles had little trouble evening its series with Hollywood 7-3. Jim Oglesby, Angel first sacker, and Pitcher Tom Sheehan of the Stars clouted four bazzers.

Trailing by three runs and with two men out in the ninth, the cellar Seals went wild yesterday and subdued the Missions 6-5. A walk, Jimmy Zint's triple, Jerry Donovan's circle swing, Elias Funk's double and Joe De Maggio's single gave San Francisco four runs in the final inning and the game.

MAKE OF BUTTER HELD DECREASING

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(AP)—Make of butter is decreasing quite rapidly among local centralizers and out-state production is also showing a loss from the recent flush output.

There was no change in general prices for the day. On the open market there continues a steady call for practically all scores and at late values.

Butterfat remains fairly steady. There is still a badly mixed price in the local egg trade with the bulk of the business below prices nominally established by local co-ops. Receipts continue to decrease.

Killers are bearing down real hard upon the price of chickens although receipts are by no means heavy. They are taking full advantage of the fact that they control distributive machinery.

Extreme scarcity of old crop potatoes is forcing still another advance in the price. Old stock is actually selling in spots higher than new which is a very unusual condition considering the lateness of the season.

There is still a fairly good demand for old crop Oregon onions although there is no shipping call to speak of. Local trade is again returning to old Oregonians in preference to new Californians.

There was much excitement in the market for strawberries as a result of the limited offerings in the trade. Sales were made sharply higher for all supplies with many orders unfilled.

PUBLIC MART HAS FINE DISPLAYS NOW

The Producers' Public market had a wonderful display of fruits and vegetables out Thursday.

Currents and raspberries are being shown on the market now, the raspberries selling for 2 boxes for 20 cents; the currents at 10 cents a box, three for 25 cents. Stall 30 had a fine display of the currents.

New cabbage is of excellent quality now.

The market has big quantities of the new potatoes coming in now. Cherries are a big item plentiful, selling at 10 cents a basket.
