BERLIN, June 23.—(AP)—Four deaths, including a suicide, resulted today from a midnight apartment searching expedition by Nazi storm troopers in the suburb of Koepenick. One Nazi and an unidentified man were killed when shots were fired and another Nazi died later from bullet wounds.

BRIDGE APPROVED

TACOMA, Wash., June 23.—(AP)—Approval has been granted by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation of the financial setup for the proposed \$3,000,000 bridge across the Narrows, to connect Tacoma with the Olympic peninsula, according to word received today from Washington, D. C., by President Ralph Shaffer of the Tacoma chamber of commerce.

Wireless Signal May Be Clue to Mattern's Fate

SEATTLE, June 23.—(AP)—Ed Stevens, prominent Seattle amateur wireless operator, today reported establishing communication with an operator of a Russian vessel who repeated the word "aeroplane" several times and also the code signal for "I have traffic for you."

Stevens said the operator apparently knew no English except the word "aeroplane" and Stevens said he was unable to get anything more intelligible from the faint signals, all in Russian.

The Seattle operator said the vessel gave its position as 69 degrees north latitude and 177 degrees east longitude and signed with the call letters RMAZ. Stevens said the station was not listed in his log.

Stevens reported the message on the possibility it might lead to information about Jimmy Mattern, who disappeared more than a week ago while attempting a round-the-world flight.

The naval radio station at Bremerton said St. Paul Island station had reported no contact with vessels off the Siberian coast.

The will of the wealthy philanthropist, who died June 13 at the age of 73, was filed for probate today. It created a trust fund for charitable uses which, attorneys said, will result in making nearly \$30,000,000 available over a period of 25 years. Between \$13,000,000 and \$15,000,000 is available immediately.
